Facilities in Kansas that intend to treat, store or dispose of PCBs are required to obtain a PCB facility construction permit from KDHE. Solomon operates a transformer reclamation facility at 302 W. 7th St., Solomon. Solomon currently processes transformers that contain dielectric fluids that are either non-PCB or contain PCBs at concentrations below 50 parts per million (ppm). Solomon proposes to construct a permitted PCB commercial storage facility immediately

adjacent to the existing transformer reclamation facility. Solomon plans to consolidate the receipt of all oil-filled electrical equipment at the new PCB facility. Dielectric transformer fluid that contains PCBs at concentrations between 50 and 1,500 ppm will be drained out of the transformers and pumped into one of two 7,137-gallon PCB storage tanks. The two tanks will be enclosed within a concrete bermed secondary containment area inside the new building. The PCB dielectric fluid will remain in the PCB storage tanks until it is shipped from the facility by vacuum tanker truck for treatment or disposal. The EPA portion of the coordinated approval will allow Solomon to operate as a commercial storer of PCBs in accordance with TSCA requirements.

Opinion No. 2007-03

Written February 21, 2007, to Rodney J. Bieker, General Counsel, Kansas State Department of Education, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter received by email on February 1, 2007, requesting an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the state level conflict of interest laws, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction concerning your question is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement:

You request this opinion in your capacity as the General Counsel for the Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE), and on behalf of Dr. Phyllis Clay, Director of Research and Evaluation for KSDE. You explain that prior to becoming employed with KSDE, Dr. Clay entered into a contract with the Pacific Institute for Research and Evaluation (PIRE) to facilitate data collection in four Kansas City, Kansas schools for a nation-wide evaluation PIRE is conducting on a drug prevention program in middle schools across the country. This data collection is a three-year process each spring that began in 2006 and will continue in the spring of 2007 and 2008. You indicate that Dr. Clay's work with PIRE is unrelated to her duties with KSDE and would be performed outside of her KSDE working hours.

Question:

May the Director of Research and Evaluation for KSDE, Dr. Phyllis Clay, on her own time outside of her state business hours, perform services under contract for PIRE?

Opinion:

Several sections of the state conflict of interest laws must be reviewed to answer your question. K.S.A. 46-286 involves participation in licensure, inspection or regulation of a business in which a state employee holds a position. K.S.A. 2006 Supp. 46-233 prohibits participation by a state employee in the making of certain contracts. Finally, K.S.A. 46-241 involves the use of confidential information by a state employee. Each will be addressed in turn.

K.S.A. 46-286 states in pertinent part:

(a) No state officer or employee, in the officer's or employee's official capacity, shall participate directly in the licensure, inspection or administration or enforcement of any regulation of or in any contract with any outside organization with which the officer or employee holds a position.

While KSDE may license, inspect and regulate the schools in Kansas City that are involved in the evaluation that PIRE is conducting, Dr. Clay's contract is with PIRE, and not with those schools. Therefore, this statute would not prohibit Dr. Clay's contractual services for PIRE.

K.S.A. 2006 Supp. 46-233, prohibits a state employee's participation in the making of contracts as follows:

(a)(1) No state officer or employee shall in the capacity as such officer or employee be substantially involved in the preparation of or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which such officer or employee is employed

(e) (2) "Substantially involved in the preparation or participate in the making of a contract" means having approved or disapproved a contract or having provided significant factual or specific information or advice or recommendations in relation to the negotiated terms of the contract.

In order to comply with this statute, Dr. Clay may not, in her capacity with KSDE, be substantially involved in preparing any negotiated contract or participate in the making of any negotiated contract between the state and PIRE. Should the occasion arise that KSDE would contract with PIRE, Dr. Clay must abstain from any participation on behalf of KSDE in the making of that contract while she is performing services for PIRE.

Finally, K.S.A. 46-241 provides that:

No state officer or employee shall disclose or use confidential information acquired in the course of his or her official duties in order to further his or her own economic interest or those of any other person.

This statute prohibits Dr. Clay from using any confidential information obtained in her employment with KSDE for her financial gain or for the financial gain of any other person, which would include PIRE.

In conclusion, the conflict of interest laws do not prohibit the Director of Research and Evaluation for KSDE from performing contractual services for PIRE as long as she does not, in her capacity with KSDE, participate in the making of a negotiated contract between KSDE and PIRE or misuse confidential information.

Opinion No. 2007-04

Written February 21, 2007, to Peter Freund, Chief of Staff, House Majority Leader, Representative Ray Merrick, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter dated January 26, 2007, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the Campaign Finance Act (K.S.A. 25-4142 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction concerning your questions is limited to the application of K.S.A. 25-4142 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement:

We understand that you are asking for this opinion in your capacity as Chief of Staff for the House Majority Leader, Representative Ray Merrick. You have received questions regarding for whom a legislator may solicit contributions during the legislative session. You acknowledge that a legislator may not solicit contributions for his or her own campaign during a legislative session from a political committee (PAC) or business; however, you ask for clarification regarding a legislator's limitations on soliciting contributions for party committees or PACs during a legislative session.

Question:

1. May a legislator solicit contributions *for* a political committee (PAC) or party committee after January 1 of each year and prior to adjournment sine die of the regular legislative session or at any other time in which the legislature is in session?

Opinion:

K.S.A. 25-4153a states as follows:

(a) No registered lobbyist, political committee or person, other than an individual, shall make a contribution after January 1 of each year and prior to adjournment sine die of the regular session of the legislature or at any other time in which the legislature is in session to a:

(1) Legislator;

(2) candidate for membership in the legislature;

(3) state officer elected on a statewide basis;

(4) candidate for state officer elected on a statewide basis;

(5) candidate committee of persons described in paragraphs (1) through (4); or

(6) political committee established by a state committee of any political party and designated as a recognized political committee for the senate or house of representatives.

(b) No legislator, officer, candidate or committee described in paragraphs (1) through (6) of subsection (a) shall accept or solicit any contribution as defined by K.S.A. 25-4143 and amendments thereto, from any registered lobbyist, political committee or person, other than an individual, during such period of time described in subsection (a).

While your question asks *for* whom a legislator may solicit a contribution, the statute quoted above only addresses *from* whom a legislator may solicit a contribution. The Campaign Finance Act (Act) does not directly limit for whom a legislator may solicit, but it does prohibit a legislator from soliciting "contributions" as defined in the Act from registered lobbyists, political committees, or persons, other than individuals, after January 1 and prior to adjournment sine die of the regular legislative session or any other time the legislature is in session.

K.S.A. 2006 Supp. 25-4143(j) defines "person" as "any individual, committee, corporation, partnership, trust, organization or association." Because committees, including PACs and party committees, are included as persons under the Act, a legislator may solicit contributions during a legislative session only from individuals.

K.S.A. 2006 Supp. 25-4143(e)(1) defines "contribution" as follows:

"Contribution" means: (A) any advance, conveyance, deposit, distribution, gift, loan or payment of money or any other thing of value given to a candidate, candidate committee, party committee or political committee for the express purpose of nominating, electing or defeating a clearly identified candidate for a state or local office.

(B) Any advance, conveyance, deposit, distribution, gift, loan or payment of money or any other thing of value made to expressly advocate the nomination, election or defeat of a clearly identified candidate for a state or local office;

(C) a transfer of funds between any two or more candidate committees, party committees, or political committees; (D) the payment, by a person, other than a candidate, candidate committee, party committee or political committee, of compensation to an individual for the personal services rendered without charge to or for a candidate's campaign or to or for any such committee;

(E) the purchase of tickets or admissions to, or advertisements in journals or programs for, testimonial events;

(F) a mailing of materials designed to expressly advocate the nomination, election or defeat of a clearly identified candidate, which is made and paid for by a party committee with the consent of such candidate.

Legislators may, after January 1 and prior to adjournment sine die of the legislative session, solicit contributions from any person, lobbyist or PAC *for* any PAC, party committee or candidate not listed in K.S.A. 25-4153a(a)(1) through (6). Therefore, a legislator may solicit for any PAC or party committee <u>other than</u> a political committee established by a state committee of any political party and designated as a recognized political committee for the senate or house of representatives.

Opinion No. 2007-05

Written February 21, 2007, to the Honorable Robert "Bob" Grant, State Representative, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter dated January 25, 2007, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the Campaign Finance Act (K.S.A. 25-4142 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction concerning your questions is limited to the application of K.S.A. 25-4142 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement:

We understand that you are asking for this opinion in your capacity as a State Representative. You indicate that you were involved in an accident on your trip home from Topeka on January 12, 2007, which damaged your vehicle such that it could no longer be driven. You had to rent a vehicle for your transportation from your home in Cherokee, Kansas to legislative sessions in Topeka. You acknowledge that you receive mileage payments of 43 cents per mile for round trips to Topeka to perform your legislative duties; however, that amount does not cover the cost of the rental car. You ask whether you may use your campaign funds to pay for the rental of the car.

Question:

Under the facts you have presented, may you use campaign funds to rent a vehicle to drive to Topeka to perform your legislative duties?

Opinion:

K.S.A.25-4157a, which limits the use of campaign funds, states in pertinent part as follows:

(a) No moneys received by any candidate or candidate committee of any candidate as a contribution under this act shall be used or be made available for the personal use of the candidate and no such moneys shall be used by such candidate or the candidate committee of such candidate except for:

(1) Legitimate campaign purposes;

(2) expenses of holding political office;

(continued)

For the purpose of this subsection, expenditures for "personal use" shall include expenditures to defray normal living expenses for the candidate or the candidate's family and expenditures for the personal benefit of the candidate having no direct connection with or effect upon the campaign of the candidate or the holding of public office.

The response to your question depends on whether, under the Campaign Finance Act, the rental of a vehicle is a legitimate expense of holding political office. The statute specifically prohibits expenditures of campaign funds for personal use. The expenditure must have a direct effect upon the campaign of the candidate or the holding of public office. All other expenditures are for personal use, and thus are prohibited.

In Opinion No. 1996-16, we addressed the payment of auto expenses using campaign funds by stating two options that a candidate or office holder may use to be reimbursed from his or her campaign fund. One option is to be reimbursed by using the current mileage rate for each mile traveled on campaign or office holder business, and any extraordinary maintenance or repairs will be determined on a case-by-case basis. The other option is to be reimbursed for actual gas, oil and normal maintenance costs based on detailed records kept by the office holder. Opinion No. 2000-51 further clarifies the use of campaign funds for expenses associated with mileage by stating as follows:

Legislators and candidates for the legislature may use campaign funds to pay for otherwise un-reimbursed expenditures for mileage associated with the expenses of holding political office or for legitimate campaign purposes.

Driving from your home to Topeka to perform your legislative duties is an office holder expense for which you are compensated by the Legislature based on your mileage. As stated in Opinion No. 1996-16, the Commission will consider, on a case-by-case basis, payment of extraordinary maintenance or repairs. In your case, your accident occurred while returning home from performing your legislative duties. The damage to your car was such that the car could not be driven. Because you had no other vehicle, you were forced to rent a car in order to carry out your legislative duties in Topeka. Opinion No. 2000-51 allows you to use your campaign funds to pay for unreimbursed expenditures. In this case, that would be the difference between the mileage you receive from the Legislature and the cost of the rental vehicle to drive to Topeka to perform your legislative duties.

Any bid received after the designated closing time will not be considered and will be returned unopened.

All bids shall be submitted to the Planning Department's customer service staff in sealed envelopes addressed to the city of Lenexa, Kansas, attention: city clerk, and marked "Bid for: Prairie Star Parkway (K-7 — Mize)."

Copies of plans, specifications, bidding documents and other contract documents are on file at the Planning Department, Lenexa City Hall. Bidders desiring contract documents for use in preparing bids may obtain a set of such documents at the address above upon payment of \$500, which amount is nonrefundable.

Contractors should read and be fully familiar with all contract documents including addenda before submitting a bid. In submitting a bid, the bidder warrants that it has read the contract documents and is fully familiar therewith and that it has visited the site of the work to fully inform itself as to all existing conditions and limitations, and shall include in its bid a sum to cover the cost of all items of the work as specified in the contract documents.

No oral telegraphic, telephonic proposals or alterations will be considered. Facsimile transmissions will not be accepted.

. . .

The following items must be included in the sealed envelope with the bid:

a. Bid form;

b. 5% Bid security—bid bond, cashier's check or certified check (see below).

Each bidder shall file with its bid a bid bond, a cashier's check or a certified check drawn on an acceptable bank, made payable to city of Lenexa, Kansas, in an amount equal to 5 percent of the total bid, which shall be retained by the city of Lenexa until a contract for the project has been executed. Bid bonds will be returned to the bidders, with the exception of the best and lowest and second best and second lowest responsible bidders, within 21 days after their bids are rejected. The bid deposit of the lowest and the second lowest responsible bidders will be returned when the performance bond, maintenance bond and statutory bond, each in an amount equal to 100 percent of the contract amount, required insurance certificates and other required documents shall have been furnished and the contract documents have been executed by the successful bidder.

In the event the low bidder is unable to execute the contract, for whatever reason, within the time provided in the notice of award, the city may annul the notice of award and the bid deposit may be forfeited, and the city shall exercise its legal prerogatives, including, but not limited to, enforcement of its rights as to the bid security or specific performance.

The city reserves the right to accept or reject any and all bids and to waive any technicalities or irregularities therein. Bids may be modified or withdrawn by written request of the bidder received in the office of the city clerk prior to the time and date for bid opening.

All bidders agree that rejection shall create no liability on the part of the city because of such rejection, and the filing of any bid in response to this notice shall constitute an agreement of the bidder to these conditions.

A pre-bid conference will be held at 3 p.m. March 28 in the Executive Conference Room, upper level, Lenexa City Hall.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 17.—UNIFORM COMMERCIAL CODE

7-17-22. Search logic. (a) Search results shall be produced by applying only standardized search logic to each name presented to the filing officer. Human judgment shall not play a role in determining the results of the search. The standardized search logic used shall meet the following criteria:

(1) There is no limit to the number of matches that may be returned in response to the search criteria.

(2) The characters searched are letters "a" through "z" and numbers 0 through 9.

(3) No distinction is made between uppercase and lowercase letters, and all letters are converted to uppercase in the filing office database.

(4) Punctuation marks, accents, and suffixes are disregarded.

(5) Words and abbreviations at the end of a name that indicate the existence or nature of an organization are disregarded. These words and abbreviations include the following:

(A) Association;

(B) bank;

(C) church;

(D) college;

(E) company;

(F) corporation;

(G) club;

(H) foundation;

(I) fund;

(J) incorporated;

(K) institute;

(L) limited;

(M) society;

(N) syndicate;

(O) trust;

(P) union;

(Q) university;

(R) limited partnership;

(S) LP;

(T) limited liability company;

(U) LLC;

(V) limited liability partnership;

(W) LLP;

(X) professional association;

(Y) chartered; and

(Z) the following abbreviations: co., corp., inc., ltd., and P.A.

(6) The word "the" at the beginning of the search criteria is disregarded.

(7) All spaces are disregarded.

(8) For middle names of individuals, initials are equated with all names that begin with these initials, and the absence of a middle name or initial is equated with all middle names and initials.

(9) The word "and" and the symbol "&" are equated with each other.

(b) After using the criteria in subsection (a) to modify the name of the debtor requested to be searched, the search shall reveal only names of debtors that are contained in unlapsed financing statements and exactly match the name requested, as modified.
