# Federal Emergency Management Agency Public Notice

The Department of Homeland Security, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) hereby gives notice to the public of its intent to reimburse state and local governments and agencies, and eligible private nonprofit organizations for eligible costs incurred to repair and/or replace facilities damaged by severe storms, tornadoes and flooding occurring from May 4, 2007 to May 18, 2007. This notice applies to the Public Assistance (PA) and Hazard Mitigation Grant (HMGP) programs implemented under the authority of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 USC §§ 5121-5206.

Under a major disaster declaration (FEMA-1699-DR) signed by the President on May 6, 2007, Kiowa County in the state of Kansas has been designated for PA. On May 18, 2007, Barton, Edwards, Pratt and Stafford counties were designated for PA. Additional counties may be designated at a later date as a result of ongoing damage assessments. All counties within the state of Kansas are eligible to apply for HMGP assistance.

This public notice concerns activities that may affect historic properties, activities that are located in or affect wetland areas or the 100-year floodplain (areas determined to have a 1 percent probability of flooding in any given year), and critical actions within the 500-year floodplain. Such activities may adversely affect the historic property, floodplain or wetland, or may result in continuing vulnerability to flood damage.

Such activities may include restoring facilities located in a floodplain with eligible damage to pre-disaster condition. Examples of such activities include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1. Non-emergency debris removal and disposal;
- 2. Non-emergency protective measures;
- Repair/replacement of roads, including streets, culverts and bridges;
- 4. Repair/replacement of public dams, reservoirs and channels;
- 5. Repair/replacement of public buildings and related equipment;
- 6. Repair/replacement of public water control facilities, pipes and distribution systems;
- 7. Repair/replacement of public utilities, including sewage treatment plants, sewers and electrical power distribution systems; and
- 8. Repair/replacement of eligible private, nonprofit facilities (hospitals, educational centers, emergency and custodial care services, etc.).

The President's Executive Order 11988, Floodplain Management, and Executive Order 11990, Protection of Wetlands, requires that all federal actions in or affecting the 100-year floodplain or wetland areas be reviewed for opportunities to move the facility out of the floodplain or wetland and to reduce the risk of future damage or loss from flooding and minimize harms to wetlands. However, FEMA has determined that in certain situations, there are no alternatives to restoring an eligible facility located in the floodplain to its pre-disaster condition. Normally, these situations meet all of the following criteria:

- 1. The FEMA estimated cost of repairs is less than 50 percent of the estimated cost to replace the facility and the replacement cost of the facility is less than \$100,000.
- 2. The facility is not located in a floodway or coastal high hazard area.
- The facility has not sustained structural damage in a previous presidentially declared flood disaster or emergency.
- 4. The facility is not defined as critical (e.g., hospital, generating plant, contains dangerous materials, emergency operation center, etc.).

For routine activities, this will be the only public notice provided. FEMA will provide assistance to restore the facilities described above to their pre-disaster condition except when measures to mitigate the effects of future flooding may be incorporated into the restoration work. For example, insufficient waterway openings under culverts and bridges may cause water backup to wash out the structures. The water backup could wash out the facility and could damage other facilities in the area. Increasing the size of the waterway opening would mitigate, or lessen, the potential for this damage. Additional examples of mitigation measures include providing erosion protection at bridge abutments or levees, and extending entrance tubes on sewage lift stations.

Disaster assistance projects to restore facilities, which do not meet at least one of the four criteria listed above, must undergo a detailed review. The review will include a study to determine if the facility can be moved out of the floodplain. The public is invited to participate in the review. The public may identify alternatives for restoring the facility and may participate in analyzing the impact of the alternatives on the facility and the floodplain. An address and phone number for obtaining information about specific assistance projects is provided at the end of this notice. The final determination regarding the restoration of these facilities in a floodplain will be announced in future public notices.

Due to the urgent need for and/or use of the certain facilities in a floodplain, actions to restore the facility may have started before the federal inspector visits the site. Some of these facilities may meet the criteria for a detailed review to determine if they should be relocated. Generally, facilities may be restored in their original location where at least one of the following conditions applies:

- 1. The facility, such as a flood control device or bridge, is functionally dependent on its floodplain location.
- 2. The facilities, such as a park or other open-use space, already represent sound floodplain management and, therefore, there is no need to change it.
- 3. The facility, such as a road or a utility, is an integral part of a larger network that could not be relocated economically.
- 4. Emergency action is needed to address a threat to public health and safety.

The effects of not relocating the facilities will be examined. In each case, the examination must show an overriding public need for the facility at its original location that clearly outweighed the requirements in the Executive Order to relocate the facility out of the floodplain. FEMA will also consult state and local officials to make certain that no actions taken will violate either state or local floodplain protection standards. The restoration of these facilities may also incorporate certain measures designed to mitigate the effects of future flooding. This will be the only notice to the public concerning these facilities.

FEMA also intends to provide Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMPG) funding under Section 404 of the Stafford Act to the state of Missouri for the purposes of mitigating future disaster damages. Hazard mitigation projects may involve the construction of a new facility (e.g., retention pond or debris dam), modification of an existing undamaged facility (e.g., improving waterway openings of bridges or culverts), and the relocation of facilities out of the floodplain. Subsequent notices will provide more specific information as project proposals are developed.

The bond will be payable solely from amounts received from the respective borrower, the obligation of which will be sufficient to pay the principal of, interest and redemption premium, if any, on the bond when it becomes due.

# Kansas Development Finance Authority Notice of Hearing

All individuals who appear at the hearing will be given an opportunity to express their views for or against the proposed financing and refinancing of the projects, and all written comments previously filed with the KDFA at its offices at 555 S. ### Notice of Hearings on Proposed Administrative Regulations

Public hearings will be conducted at the times listed below on Thursday, August 16, in the third floor conference room of the Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed regulations and changes in existing rules and regulations.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Deletria Nash, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, 66612-1678, via facsimile at (785) 291-3673, or via e-mail at dnash@ksinsurance.org. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearings.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearings and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. The charge for copies is 50 cents per page. A summary of the regulations and their economic impact follows:

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. to consider the adoption of proposed changes to the following rule and regulation:

K.A.R. 40-1-51. Securities valuation; requirements. K.A.R. 40-1-51 adopts by reference the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' "Purposes and Pro-

cedures of the Securities Valuation Office of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners" manual. The department is revoking K.A.R. 40-1-51 inasmuch as the commissioner has authority to adopt this manual without adopting a rule and regulation.

There is little or no fiscal impact on consumers, companies, the Kansas Insurance Department or other governmental agencies as a result of the revocation of this regulation inasmuch as insurance companies currently use the standards as outlined in the manual.

A public hearing will be conducted at 10:30 a.m. to consider the adoption of proposed changes to the following rule and regulation:

K.A.R. 40-3-34. Fire and casualty insurance; issuance, withholding, extension or renewal of automobile insurance policies; compliance by affiliated insurers of the same group. This regulation prohibits companies from discriminating against drivers based on age and allows companies to offer higher rates if those rates are filed and approved by the commissioner. The department is revoking this regulation because there are laws that address this issue and, therefore, the regulation is no longer necessary.

There is little or no fiscal impact on consumers, companies, the Kansas Insurance Department or other governmental agencies as a result of the revocation of this regulation given that there are laws that address the issue of age discrimination and higher rates.

A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. to consider the adoption of the following rule and regulation:

**K.A.R.** 40-2-28. Life insurance; viatical settlements. This proposed regulation adopts, by reference, the Kansas Insurance Department's policy and procedures regarding viatical settlements. The policy and procedures provide license requirements, standards, reporting requirements, general rules, and allowed and prohibited practices.

The economic impact on companies, consumers and the Kansas Insurance Department is positive, given that companies and consumers will have guidance regarding what is and is not allowed in Kansas. The economic impact on other governmental agencies is minimal, if any.

A public hearing will be conducted at 2:30 p.m. to consider the adoption of the following rule and regulation:

K.A.R. 40-3-56. Fire and casualty insurance companies; health care provider; claims. K.A.R. 40-3-56 is a proposed regulation that would define what constitutes a claim against a health care provider. This regulation is proposed to ensure that all insurers use the same criteria.

The economic impact on consumers is positive in that consumers will have a definite understanding as to whether a claim has been submitted. The economic impact on insurance companies will vary given that some companies currently may use a different definition of "claim." The economic impact on the Kansas Insurance Department and other governmental agencies will be minimal.

The following is a brief summary of the proposed regulations and economic impact statements:

K.A.R. 82-3-103. This regulation contains the requirements for filing a notice of intent to drill with the State Corporation Commission. The regulation is being amended to remove the signature requirement from the intent form. The commission is streamlining the processes for operators to file some forms and reports, including some online filing. The notice of intent to drill is the first form available for online filing. The amendments to this regulation also will extend the expiration date of the intent to one year and eliminate the need to file an extension after six months. The amendments to this regulation also contain wording changes and sentence structure edits for clarification.

Economic Impact Statement: There will be no direct economic impact from the amendments to this regulation to the industry, agency, other governmental agencies or the general public. As the processes are developed, this change may allow for additional efficiencies to the industry and to the agency, which could result in cost-savings. No additional requirements are being imposed by these amendments.

**K.A.R. 82-3-603a.** This is a new regulation that requires an operator to notify the landowner, or a representative of the landowner, of all spills that occur on a lease that also must be reported to the commission. The operator also is required to keep documentation of the notification for at least two years and provide it to the commission upon request.

Economic Impact Statement: These amendments should only create a minor administrative expense for members of the industry, and should have no economic impact on the agency, other governmental agencies or the general public.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region VII, have received a Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) hazardous waste Part A and Part B permit renewal application from Systech Environmental Corporation (Systech) located at 1420 S. Cement Road, Fredonia. The KDHE and the EPA are providing notice of their intent to renew a jointly issued RCRA hazardous waste treatment and storage permit to Systech, the operator and owner of the facility. The facility was originally permitted to store hazardous wastes in 1984. This permit was renewed and modified to expand the facility's container and tank storage capacities in 1993, and assigned the EPA identification number KSD980633259.

In October 1985, the state of Kansas received final authorization from the EPA to implement its own hazardous waste management program in lieu of the federal program except for the portions covered by the Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments HSWA of 1984. The KDHE portion of the permit (Part I) will be issued under the authority of K.S.A. 65-3430 et seq. and K.A.R. 28-31-9, and the EPA portion of the permit (Part II) will be issued under the authority of sections 3001(g), 3001(h), 3002 (b), 3004(d), 3004 (u) and (v), 3005 and 6001 of RCRA.

Part I of the permit will allow Systech Environmental Corporation to receive hazardous waste via rail and over the road in both bulk and containers from off-site generators and other hazardous waste processors; process and blend hazardous waste into a fuel for use in the adjacent cement kiln in two miscellaneous process units; store a total of 790,000 gallons of hazardous waste in 12 above-ground storage tanks; store a total of 169,500 gallons of hazardous waste in five container storage areas; and transfer hazardous waste not suitable for processing into a fuel to other RCRA-permitted facilities. The materials stored at the facility will include ignitable, corrosive, reactive, toxic, and listed liquid or solid hazardous wastes. All storage tanks and container storage areas comply with 40 CFR Part 264 Subpart I, Subpart J, Sub-

part BB, Subpart CC and Part 270 requirements for container and tank storage areas. Emergency equipment is available at the facility and appropriate warning signs are posted on the perimeter fences. The EPA portion (Part II) of the joint permit will address the requirements of HSWA.

The bonds will bear interest from their date at the rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, payable semiannually on June 1 and December 1 in each year, commencing December 1, 2007.

#### **Delivery and Payment**

The bonds will be delivered to the successful bidder properly prepared, executed and registered without cost within approximately 30 days after the date of their sale in New York, New York.

#### **Good Faith Deposit**

A good faith deposit in the form of a certified or cashier's check or financial surety bond in the amount of \$407,500 must be furnished at or prior to the time of sale by each bidder.

#### Costs

The city will pay the cost of printing the bonds and the expense of all legal services, including the opinion of Kutak Rock LLP, bond counsel, approving the legality of the bonds and the exclusion of the interest thereon (with specified minor exceptions) from federal and Kansas gross income taxes.

#### **Assessed Valuation and Indebtedness**

For the computation of the debt limitation relating to the bonds, the equalized assessed valuation of the taxable tangible property within the city for the year 2006 is \$790,194,034. The applicable total general obligation bonded indebtedness of the city as of the date of the bonds is \$101,053,041, which includes the bonds and a series of temporary notes being sold simultaneously with the bonds.

#### **Additional Information**

A complete notice of bond sale for the bonds, official statement and bid forms approved by the city will be mailed to all interested parties. Bidders may be required to be qualified in a manner established by the city before submitting a bid.
