Failure to submit the sworn statement as part of the bid approval package will make the bid nonresponsive and not eligible for award consideration.

#### Article 8.—ADVERTISING

Amendment to K.A.R. 14-8-2. Prohibited statements and restrictions in the advertising of alcoholic liquor. This regulation specifies restrictions on the advertising of liquor.

**Economic Impact:** This regulation creates no economic impact on other government agencies. The anticipated economic impact upon private business and individuals is negligible. No impact on the department is anticipated.

Amendment to K.A.R. 14-8-3. Public display of alcoholic liquor regulated. This regulation specifies restrictions on the public display of liquor.

**Economic Impact:** This regulation creates no economic impact on other government agencies. The anticipated economic impact upon private business and individuals is negligible. No impact on the department is anticipated.

#### Article 16.—LICENSES; SUSPENSION AND REVOCATION

**Revocation of K.A.R. 14-16-23. Schedule of fines and penalties.** This regulation is incomplete and potentially misleading. The categories of violations are inaccurate and the proposed fines and penalties do not fit with the current structure of the ABC's progressive penalty schedule. There also are myriad violations that are not included in any category of this regulation.

This regulation leads licensees to believe the only penalties available are those listed here, and that leads to confusion when the director exercises his authority to order a different penalty. Also, this regulation is redundant, since the statutes provide the director with the authority to order a fine of up to \$1,000 per violation, as well as revoke or suspend a license for any violation.

**Economic Împact:** The Department of Revenue does not anticipate any economic impact upon other government agencies or upon private businesses or individuals. The revocation of this regulation will not have any economic impact upon the Department of Revenue.

Revocation of K.A.R. 14-16-24. Appeals to the secretary of revenue from orders of the director. This regulation implicitly requires an evidentiary hearing on appeal from the director's order to the secretary or her designee. Both the Liquor Control Act and the Club and Drinking Establishment Act require the director to hold an evidentiary KAPA hearing prior to suspending or revoking a license. On appeal to the secretary, KAPA allows for briefs and oral arguments, but no new evidentiary hearing. By implicitly requiring a second evidentiary hearing, this regulation conflicts with the requirements of the KAPA, specifically K.S.A. 77-527. Also, the department does not want to hold two evidentiary hearings because it gives a licensee two bites at the apple as well as potentially creating conflicting records that might go to the district court.

**Economic Impact:** The Department of Revenue does not anticipate any economic impact upon other government agencies or upon private businesses or individuals. The revocation of this regulation will not have any economic impact upon the Department of Revenue.

#### Article 24.—WINERY SHIPPING PERMITS
