A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Thursday, February 14, in the offices of the Kansas Development Finance Authority, 555 S. Kansas Ave., Suite 202, Topeka, on the proposal for the KDFA to issue its Agricultural Development Revenue Bond for the project numbered below in the respective maximum principal amount. The bond will be issued to assist the borrower named below (who will be the owner and operator of the project) to finance the cost in the amount of the bond, which is then typically purchased by a lender bank who then, through the KDFA, loans the bond proceeds to the borrower for the purposes of acquiring the project. The project shall be located as shown:

Project No. 000709—Maximum Principal Amount: \$38,578.68. Owner/Operator: Darryl and Debra Blocker. Description: Acquisition of livestock and construction of a pole barn to be used by the owner/operator for farming purposes. The project is being financed by the lender for Darryl and Debra Blocker and is located at Section 26,

Township 12, Range 3, Dickinson County, Kansas, approximately 2 miles west of Chapman on Old 40 Highway to Paint Road, then north 1.5 miles.

The bond, when issued, will be a limited obligation of the KDFA and will not constitute a general obligation or indebtedness of the state of Kansas or any political subdivision thereof, including the KDFA, nor will it be an indebtedness for which the faith and credit and taxing powers of the state of Kansas are pledged. The bond will be payable solely from amounts received from the respective borrower, the obligation of which will be sufficient to pay the principal of, interest and redemption premium, if any, on the bond when it becomes due.

All individuals who appear at the hearing will be given an opportunity to express their views, and all written comments previously filed with the KDFA at its offices at 555 S. Kansas Ave., Suite 202, Topeka, 66603, will be considered. Additional information regarding the project may be obtained by contacting the KDFA.

Opinion 2007-34

Counties and County Officers—Fire Protection Districts in Any County—Tax Levies; Use of Proceeds, Limitations; Election on Levies, When.

Taxation—Aggregate Tax Levy Limitations—Suspension of Tax Levy Limitations.

Counties and County Officers—General Provisions—Home Rule Powers; Limitations, Restrictions and Prohibitions; Fire District Levy Limits. William A. Taylor, III, Cowley County Counselor, Winfield, October 25, 2007.

While K.S.A. 2006 Supp. 79-5040 authorizes a fire district to exceed the five mill limit set forth in K.S.A. 2006 Supp. 19-3610, there is no similar statutory authority negating the election procedures required by K.S.A. 2006 Supp. 19-3610. Thus, any fire district that wants to exceed the five mill levy limit must follow the procedural steps set forth in that statute. K.S.A. 2006 Supp. 19-101a allows counties to exercise home rule powers in connection with governing county business. However, fire districts do not have home rule authority. They are taxing subdivisions separate and distinct from counties. Counties therefore cannot exercise county home rule power on behalf of fire districts in order to opt out of fire district statutes. Opinion No. 2008-01

Written January 16, 2008, to Sue Hack, Mayor, City of Lawrence.

This opinion is in response to your letters dated December 5, 2007, and January 10, 2008, requesting an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning local conflict of interest laws, K.S.A. 75-4301a *et seq.* We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction concerning your questions is limited to the application of K.S.A. 75-4301a *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement:

You request this opinion in your capacity as Mayor of the City of Lawrence. You are also the Director of Leadership Lawrence, a program of the Lawrence Chamber of Commerce, for which you receive compensation from the Chamber of Commerce. You explain that a new not-forprofit corporation, Destination Management, Inc. (DMI) has been established to operate the Lawrence Convention and Visitors Bureau. DMI will receive some of the receipts of the City's transient guest tax received from the Kansas Department of Revenue. DMI is managed and controlled by a board of directors made up of, among others, Chamber of Commerce representatives and representatives of the City of Lawrence, including the mayor, or the mayor's designee. DMI is exempt from taxation of corporations under section 501(c)(6) of chapter 26 of the United States Code.

Questions:

- 1. May you, as mayor, serve on the DMI board of directors when you are also employed by the Chamber of Commerce, another entity represented on the DMI board?
- 2. If you may serve on the DMI board of directors, may you, as mayor, act on matters related to DMI that are pending before your city commission, or that come before your commission in the future?

Opinion:

In response to your first question, there is nothing in the local conflict of interest laws that would prohibit you from serving on the DMI board of directors in your capacity as Mayor of the City of Lawrence even though your employer, the Lawrence Chamber of Commerce, also has representatives serving on the DMI advisory board

Turning to your second question, K.S.A. 75-4304 and 75-4305 restrict certain actions by a local governmental officer in matters relating to a business in which the local officer has a substantial interest. Therefore, to answer your second question, we must determine if your serving on the DMI board of directors would result in your having a substantial interest in DMI. K.S.A. 75-4301a(a)(4) defines "substantial interest" resulting from membership on a board of directors as follows:

If an individual or an individual's spouse holds the position of officer, director, associate partner or proprietor of any business, other than an organization exempt from federal taxation of corporations under section 501(c)(3), (4), (5), (6), (7), (8), (10), or (19) of chapter 26 of the United States code, the individual has a substantial interest in that business, irrespective of the amount of compensation received by the individual or individual's spouse. (Emphasis added.)

Because DMI is exempt from taxation under section 501(c)(6) of chapter 26 of the United States Code, you would not have a substantial interest in DMI as a result of serving as a director of DMI. In your capacity as mayor, the local conflict of interest statutes do not limit or restrict your actions on matters relating to DMI that are pending before your city commission or that come before your commission in the future.

It should be noted that although your serving as a director of DMI does not create a substantial interest in DMI, you are required by K.S.A. 75-4302a(e) to disclose your position as a director of DMI on your Statement of Substantial Interests form.

Opinion No. 2008-02

Written January 16, 2008, to Scott Allegrucci, Director, Great Plains Alliance for Clean Energy, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of January 9, 2008, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the lobbying provisions of the state level conflict of interest laws, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement:

You request this opinion in your capacity as director of the Great Plains Alliance for Clean Energy (GPACE), a 501(c)(4) advocacy organization whose mission is to support a clean, secure, profitable energy economy benefitting Kansas businesses, farms, communities, and all future Kansans. GPACE is an alliance of organizations and individuals from Kansas and elsewhere. GPACE is planning to conduct grassroots lobbying in Kansas. You seek clarification on issues pertaining to Kansas lobbying laws in order to assure members of your alliance that they are in compliance with the laws.

Questions:

- 1. Are contributors to GPACE, from Kansas or out of state, required to register a lobbyist in the state of Kansas when contributing to GPACE?
- 2. Is there a distinction under the Kansas lobbying laws between individual, corporate, not-for-profit, or other contributors from in state or out of state who contribute to a 501(c)(4) organization operating and lobbying in the state of Kansas?
- 3. Is advertising or messaging that does not explicitly direct viewers to contact their legislator regarding a particular initiative before the legislature considered lobbying, and, therefore, required to be reported as a lobbying expense?

Opinion:

In response to your first question, K.S.A. 46-222 defines "lobbyist" in pertinent part as follows:

(a) "Lobbyist" means: (1) Any person employed in considerable degree for lobbying; (2) any person formally appointed as the primary representative of an organization or other person to lobby in person on state-owned or leased property; or (3) any person who makes expenditures in an aggregate amount of \$100 or more, exclusive of personal travel and subsistence expenses, in any calendar year for lobbying. . . .

"Lobbying" is defined in K.S.A. 46-225 in pertinent part

(a) "Lobbying" means: (1) Promoting or opposing in any manner action or nonaction by the legislature on any legislative matter or the adoption or nonadoption of any rule and regulation by any state agency

"Expenditure" as used in the lobbying statutes is defined in K.A.R. 19-60-3 as follows:

- (b) "Expenditure" means a payment or contract to pay for any of the following:
- (1) The provision of hospitality in the form of recreation, food, and beverage to any state officers or employees of the legislative branch
- (2) the provision of any entertainment, gift, honoraria, or payment to any state officers or employees of the legislative branch
- (3) the production and communication of lobbying information to any state officer or employee of the legislative branch
- (4) the production and dissemination of mass media communications, letter-writing campaigns, and similar transactions that explicitly promote or oppose a clearly identified legislative matter or regulation and that urge or request the recipient to communicate directly with state officers or employees of the legislative branch, candidates for the legislature, or legislators-elect regarding that matter. . . .

K.S.A. 46-265 (a) requires that "every lobbyist shall register with the secretary of state by completing and signing a registration form . . ." K.A.R. 19-62-1 further explains who must register as follows:

Who must register.

(a) Employed lobbyists. Each person whose employment is, to a considerable degree, for the purpose of lobbying shall register as a lobbyist. . . .

(b) Appointed lobbyists. Any person formally appointed as the primary representative of an organization or of another person to lobby on state-owned or leased property shall register as a lobbyist regardless of whether the person receives compensation for lobbying. . . .

(c) Persons making lobbying expenditures. Any person who makes "expenditures" for lobbying as defined in K.A.R. 19-60-3(b), in an aggregate amount of \$100 or more in any calendar year shall register as a lobbyist. . . .

Applying the above statutes and regulations to your first question, only persons who engage directly in "lob-bying" as defined by K.S.A. 46-225 must register as a lob-byist. There are no statutes or regulations that require a person to register a lobbyist when the person makes a contribution to an organization such as GPACE.

Turning to your second question, the Kansas lobbying laws do not regulate or limit who may contribute to a 501(c)(4) organization that engages in lobbying. Further,

there are no requirements for such an organization to report their contributions. Therefore, there is no distinction under Kansas lobbying laws between individual, corporate, not-for-profit, or any other contributors from in state or out of state who contribute to GPACE.

In response to your third question, according to the definition of "lobbying" in K.S.A. 46-225, advertising or messaging that promotes or opposes action or nonaction by the legislature on any legislative matter constitutes lobbying. K.S.A. 46-219 defines "legislative matter" as "any bill, resolution, nomination, or other issue or proposal pending before the legislature or any committee, subcommittee, or council thereof." K.A.R. 19-61-1 further explains "legislative matters" in pertinent part as follows:

(a) . . . An issue or proposal is pending before any such body [the legislature or any committee, subcommittee, or council thereof] if it is being directly considered by such body, if it has been communicated to such body or a member thereof even if not directly considered by it, or if it is an issue subject to continuing review by any such body.

(1) Any communication which is intended to advocate action or nonaction by the legislature on a legislative matter, including communications with other persons with the intent that such persons communicate with legislators in regard thereto, constitutes lobbying. . . .

(b) Exceptions. The communication of factual material which is not intended to promote or oppose action or non-action on a legislative matter and which is not accompanied by active advocacy does not constitute lobbying.

If an advertisement or message promotes or opposes action or nonaction by the legislature on any legislative matter, it meets the definition of "lobbying" and would be required to be reported as a lobbying expense, even if it does not direct viewers to contact their legislator. Whether a particular advertisement or message falls within the exceptions of K.A.R. 19-61-1(b), or whether it constitutes lobbying, depends on the specific content of that particular advertisement or message. Therefore, without viewing a particular message or advertisement, we cannot determine whether or not it constitutes lobbying and would be required to be reported as a lobbying expense.

Opinion No. 2008-03

Written January 16, 2008, to Tom Stockburger, SAS Regional Office, Greenwood Village, Colorado.

This opinion is in response to your letter received by email on December 17, 2007, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the state level conflict of interest laws, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction concerning your questions is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement:

You are asking for this opinion in your capacity as the account representative for SAS Institute for the State of Kansas. SAS provides software to state agencies through a contract with the State. There are approximately 35-80

state employees of the executive branch who use SAS software. You would like to conduct quarterly update sessions for state employees who use SAS software. The primary focus of the sessions will be educational, but you will also talk about new features of the software or new software products that may be of interest.

Ouestions:

- 1. Can SAS sponsor quarterly sessions during the lunch period and provide state attendees lunch at no cost to the attendees?
- 2. Can SAS sponsor quarterly sessions in the morning or late in the day and provide state attendees snacks and beverages at no cost to the attendees?
- 3. Can SAS provide a nominal gift at these sessions to state attendees if the value of the gift is less than \$40.00?

Opinion:

K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 46-237a limits the receipt of meals and gifts by officers and employees of the executive branch of state government. That statute states in pertinent part:

- (a) The provisions of this section shall apply to:
- (1) The governor;
- (2) the lieutenant governor;
- (3) the governor's spouse;
- (4) all officers and employees of the executive branch of state government; and
- (5) all members of boards, commissions and authorities of the executive branch of state government.
- (b) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept any gift, economic opportunity, loan, gratuity, special discount or service provided because of such person's official position, except:
- (1) A gift having an aggregate value of less than \$40 given at a ceremony or public function where the person is accepting the gift in such person's official capacity; or

(3) anything of value received by the person on behalf of the state that inures to the benefit of the state or that becomes the property of the state. . . .

(c) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept free or special discount meals from a source outside state government, except:

(4) food such as soft drinks, coffee or snack foods not offered as part of a meal;

(5) any meal the value of which is \$25 or less;

(6) meals provided to a person when the person's presence at the event or meeting at which the meal is provided serves a legitimate state purpose or interest and the agency of which such person is an officer or employee authorizes such person's attendance at such event or meeting. . . . (Emphasis added.)

In response to your first question, SAS may provide a lunch to state employees who attend your sessions as long as the value of the lunch does not exceed \$25.00. Additionally, SAS may provide a lunch that exceeds \$25.00 in value to state employees, but only if the employees receive authorization from their agency as required by K.S.A. 46-237a (c)(6).

Turning to your second question, foods such as soft drinks, coffee and snack foods may be provided by SAS to state employees at any time.

In response to your third question, state employees of the executive branch are prohibited from accepting any gift, regardless of value, unless the acceptance falls within one of the exceptions stated in K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 46-237a(b). The gift limitation of \$40 only applies if the gift is given at a ceremony or public function. It does not appear that any of the exceptions would apply to the facts you have provided, unless the gift is such that it would inure to the benefit of the state, and the employee accepts the gift on behalf of the state. Therefore, you may not provide personal gifts to state employees at your quarterly update sessions; however, gifts that benefit the state and are accepted on behalf of the state and become state property may be provided.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 3.—FIRE AND CASUALTY INSURANCE

- **40-3-52.** Fire and casualty insurance; title insurers; controlled business arrangements. (a) For the purpose of this regulation, "controlled business" shall have the meaning specified in K.A.R. 40-3-43.
- (b) As a part of the report stating the percentage of closed title orders originating from a controlled business arrangement pursuant to K.S.A. 40-2404(14)(h) and amendments thereto, each title insurer or title agent engaged in a controlled business arrangement shall submit the following information to the commissioner:
- (1) The identity of each producer of title business involved in the controlled business arrangement;
- (2) the date on which the business year began for the controlled business arrangement;
- (3) the identity of any federally chartered bank or savings association affiliated with the title insurer, if such an affiliation exists; and
- (4) the date of the end of the title insurer's or title agency's business year.
- (c) Each insurer or title agent required by subsection (b) to file a report shall submit the report to the commissioner pursuant to K.S.A. 40-2404(14)(h) and amendments thereto. (Authorized by K.S.A. 40-103 and K.S.A. 2006 Supp. 40-2404(14)(j); implementing K.S.A. 40-2403 and K.S.A. 2006 Supp. 40-2404(14); effective Feb. 15, 2008.)
