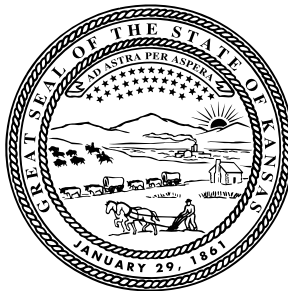

Construction Manager At-Risk Services

Notice is hereby given of the commencement of negotiations for construction management at-risk services for the renovation of Tower "A" of the Jayhawker Towers Residence Hall on the University of Kansas campus in Lawrence. These services are contingent upon approval of this alternative project delivery method by the State Building Advisory Commission at a public hearing held June 11. The estimated construction cost is approximately \$4 million. The project schedule calls for completion in July 2009.

The construction manager at-risk will provide budgeting, cost estimating, scheduling, constructability reviews and value engineering studies; divide the project into scopes of work for bidding; prequalify subcontractors and take bids for the work; review bids with the design team and owner to determine bids to accept; prepare cost estimates for the unbid portions of work and provide a guaranteed maximum price and a bond for the work as a whole; and manage construction and track all costs for the design team and owner's review.

General areas of concern include management of an extremely limited staging area adjacent to another concurrent construction project, while maintaining use of and access to adjacent occupied buildings and parking lots, control of demolition and construction noise, avoiding conflicts with vehicular and pedestrian traffic in the area, and delivering the project within a very tight budget, on an accelerated construction schedule.

The Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services administers the Intermediate Care Facilities for the Mentally Retarded (ICFsMR) payment program on behalf of the Kansas Health Policy Authority. The secretary is publishing the methodology for a rate adjustment to begin July 1, 2008. Rate adjustment is required to adhere to federal requirements that durable medical equipment and supplies (DME) costs must be included in ICFsMR per diem rate. DME expenditures will be included on annual cost reports submitted by ICFsMR to SRS. The fiscal impact expected is an increase of annual aggregate state and federal expenditures for state fiscal year 2009 of \$43,253.

Methodology for rate adjustment related to durable medical equipment (DME) and supplies:

To determine how to compensate providers for increased DME expenses incurred after July 1, 2008, and not captured in prior cost reports, the following methodology is being utilized:

- Historical data cost analysis of durable medical equipment supplies expenditures for residents of ICFsMR statewide was completed and used to calculate per diem rate adjustments.
- The total historical costs of DME for state fiscal year 2007 was divided by 200 beds and then divided by 365 days to equal a \$.59 cents per diem rate adjustment.

Executive Order 08-06

WHEREAS, Article 1, §3 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests the supreme power of the state in the Governor; and

WHEREAS, energy production is one of the core foundations of our state's economy; and

WHEREAS, the production of energy benefits the long term economic and employment health of the state; and

WHEREAS, the formation of public policy is dependent upon accurate and timely information being made available to Kansas policy makers; and

WHEREAS, policies to encourage renewable energy and energy efficiency, and to extend the life of existing energy resources will lay the foundation for Kansas' energy future; and

WHEREAS, after decades of standing as a net energy exporter, Kansas has now become a net importer of energy; and

WHEREAS, it is the goal to help ensure that Kansans have low cost, reliable and sustainable energy, produced in-state, to the fullest extent possible.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby reformulate the composition of the Kansas Energy Council ("Council") with the following purposes and charges:

1. The Council shall collect and compile information pertaining to energy resources, including wind and biomass, in the state, as well as the availability, production and use of energy in the state.

2. Based on such data, the Council shall consider and recommend strategies to:

a. Ensure a low-cost, reliable and sustainable energy supply;

b. Increase energy efficiency and conservation;

c. Develop a balanced renewable energy policy that promotes our state's renewable and alternative energy resources and preserves those natural ecosystems and places of scenic beauty that cannot be replaced;

d. Extend the life of existing energy resources; and

e. Enhance energy related research and development.

3. These strategies will be published annually in the Kansas Energy Report, and include estimates of energy consumption by Kansas residents for the next 12, 36 and 60 months by energy category, which will be updated at least every three years.

4. The Council shall advise of trends identified in relation to energy production, consumption and any tax or revenue implications.

5. The Council shall consider and recommend, as appropriate:

a. Appropriate means to increase the productive life of Kansas energy resources;

b. Appropriate means to increase the state's self-reliance on its own energy sources through:

i. Increased efficiency in the use of its resources,

ii. Identification of potential energy resources, and

iii. Identification of policy and tax issues that positively or adversely impact self-reliance;

c. Ways to avoid loss of tax revenues and employment opportunities related to energy resource management;

d. Policies to increase the export of energy from Kansas;

e. Policies to encourage renewable energy development;

f. Policies to encourage energy efficiency; and

g. Such other policies or actions related to energy resource management as may be identified.

6. The Council shall determine ways to encourage energy-related research and development.

7. The Council shall annually report their findings and recommendations to the Kansas Corporation Commission, the Governor and the legislature no later than January 15th.

8. The Council shall consist of 34 members as follows:

a. The state geologist, or designee;

b. The chairperson of the Kansas Corporation Commission, or designee;

c. The consumer counsel of the Citizens' Utility Ratepayer Board, or designee;

d. 25 appointments by the Governor; including:

i. An energy economist serving on the faculty of a state education institution;

ii. An individual knowledgeable in energy efficiency and conservation;

iii. An individual knowledgeable in tax and revenue issues related to energy use or production;

iv. An individual knowledgeable in energy production issues as they relate to agriculture;

v. An individual knowledgeable in environmental issues related to energy use and production;

vi. An individual knowledgeable in renewable energy resources;

vii. An individual knowledgeable in residential housing;

viii. An individual knowledgeable in commercial and industrial buildings;

ix. A representative of oil producers;

x. A representative of natural gas producers;

xi. A representative of refiners of petroleum products;

xii. A representative of marketers of petroleum products;

xiii. A representative of investor-owned generators of electricity;

xiv. A representative of rural electric cooperatives;

xv. A representative of municipally owned or operated electric utilities;

xvi. A representative of generators of electricity from renewable energy resources;

xvii. A representative of the trucking industry;

xviii. A representative of natural gas utilities;

xix. A representative of Kansas Association of Counties;

xx. A representative of the League of Kansas Municipalities;

xxi. The Secretary of Commerce, or designee;

xxii. The President of the Kansas Development Finance Authority, or designee;

xxiii. The Secretary of Transportation, or designee;

xxiv. The Secretary of Health and Environment, or designee;

(continued)

xv. The Secretary of Agriculture, or designee;

e. Three members of the House of Representatives who have substantial knowledge of energy, agriculture or business development, two to be appointed by the Speaker of the House and one to be appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives; and

f. Three members of the Senate who have substantial knowledge of energy, agriculture or business development, two to be appointed by the President of the Senate and one to be appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate.

9. Of the members appointed by the Governor subsequent to this order, one shall serve a term of four years, one shall serve a term of three years, one shall serve a term of two years and one shall serve a term of one year, and thereafter, terms shall be for four years;

10. All other members shall serve terms consistent with their offices, employment or appointment.

11. The Lieutenant Governor shall serve as co-chairperson. The Governor shall annually select a co-chairperson from among the members. The co-chairperson appointed from the membership of the Council shall serve as presiding officer. The Council may elect other officers among its members and may establish any committees deemed necessary to discharge its responsibilities.

12. Members of the Council shall not receive compensation, subsistence, allowance or associated expenses. The co-chairperson appointed from the membership of the Council shall be reimbursed for expenses associated with Council business. Officers or employees of state agencies who are appointed to the Council as part of their duties shall be authorized to participate on the Council and may claim subsistence, allowance, mileage or associated expenses as permitted by law.

13. Plans, reports, or recommendations of any nature adopted by the Council shall be considered advice to the Governor and legislature and shall not be construed as official policy, position or interpretation of laws or rules and regulation by the State Corporation Commission or the Department of Health and Environment nor shall they be bound in any manner to consider any such advice when conducting their advisory and regulatory responsibilities.

This order supersedes Executive Order No. 08-04. This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 08-06 and shall become effective immediately.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted by the Kansas Department of Labor at 10 a.m. Tuesday, August 19, at the Kansas Department of Labor, 401 S.W. Topeka Blvd., third floor conference room, Topeka, to consider the adoption and changes to boiler specifications and inspections regulations.

The regulations subject to this hearing notice are K.A.R. 49-45-1, 49-45-2, 49-45-3, 49-45-4, 49-45-4a, 49-45-5, 49-45-6, 49-45-7, 49-45-8, 49-45-9, 49-45-20, 49-45-28, 49-45-29, 49-45-29b, 49-45-31, 49-45-34, 49-45-35, 49-45-37 and 49-49-1.

This 60-day notice constitutes a public comment period for the purposes of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statement in an accessible format. The proposed changes to existing regulations found in K.A.R. 49, Article 45 update the boiler specifications and inspections regulations to conform to the standards currently used by the industry. These changes assure uniformity in applicable standards for the safe operation of covered boilers.

The change to **K.A.R. 49-49-1** will increase the fee for a certificate of inspection from \$30 to \$35 to assist in offsetting the increase in administrative costs.

The proposed changes to **K.A.R. 49-45-1, 49-45-2, 49-45-3, 49-45-4, 49-45-4a, 49-45-5, 49-45-6, 49-45-7, 49-45-8, 49-45-9, 49-45-20, 49-45-28, 49-45-29, 49-45-29b, 49-45-31, 49-45-34, 49-45-35** and **49-45-37** will have no appreciable economic impact on the operation of boilers subject to the Kansas Boiler Safety Act, K.S.A. 44-913 et seq. These changes are not mandated by a federal program, but ensure that all boilers in the state are operated, installed and repaired in compliance with current industry standards. The changes mean that the department is administering and enforcing the boiler safety act in conformity with current industry standards.

The proposed change to **K.A.R. 49-49-1** will have nominal economic impact on the operation of boilers subject to the Kansas Boiler Safety Act, K.S.A. 44-913 et seq. The increase is allowed by K.S.A. 44-926 to be used as funding for the state general fund and the boiler inspection fee. The change is not mandated by the federal law. This increase in cost will affect all boilers operated within the state to which an inspection certificate is issued pursuant to K.S.A. 44-924(b). Less costly ways have been considered, but due to the ever-increasing costs of material and personnel there is no other less costly way to offset the increase in administrative costs.
