Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday, June 3, in Room 108 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the manager of technician services, Room 1031, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days

in advance of the hearing by contacting Ann Stevenson at (785) 296-7296. Handicapped parking is located at the south end of the Landon State Office Building, directly across the street from the building's north entrance, and on Ninth Street. The north entrance to the building is accessible to individuals with disabilities.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 109-2-9. Variances. A change to the current regulation clarifies the application process for those requesting a variance from all or part of a current emergency medical services regulation. This new regulation specifies the time for submission, the requirement to show "serious hardship" and the maximum length for which a variance can be granted.

K.A.R. 109-3-1. Standards for ambulance attendants. A change to the current regulation removes the term "driver" from the regulation and changes the age for an attendant to 17 years old.

Notice to Consulting Engineers

The Kansas Department of Transportation is seeking qualified consulting engineering firms for safety projects on an as-needed basis according to guidelines provided by KDOT's Bureau of Transportation Safety and Technology. Two or four firms will be selected. A response may be submitted by e-mail to neil@ksdot.org or seven signed copies of the response can be mailed to Neil Rusch, P.E., Assistant to the Director, Division of Engineering and Design, KDOT, Eisenhower State Office Building, 700 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, 66603-3754. Responses shall be limited to four pages and must be received by noon April 23 for the consulting engineering firm to be considered.

From the firms expressing interest, the Consultant Selection Committee will select a list of the most highly qualified (not less than three and not more than five) and invite them to attend an individual interview conference. At this time, the consulting firms can more thoroughly discuss their experience related to the type of project at hand and will be expected to discuss, in some detail, their approach to this project and the personnel to be assigned to the project. Firms not selected to be short-listed will be notified by letter.

The Consultant Negotiating Committee, appointed by the Secretary of Transportation, will conduct the discussions with the firms invited to the individual interview conferences. The committee will select the firm to perform the professional services required for completing the advertised project. After the selection of this firm, the remaining firms will be notified by letter of the outcome.

It is KDOT's policy to use the following criteria as the basis for selection of the consulting engineering firms:

1. Size and professional qualifications;
2. experience of staff;
3. location of firm with respect to proposed project;
4. work load of firm; and
5. firm's performance record.

The firm's accounting system must have the following capabilities before the firm may be awarded a contract:

- Valid, reliable and current costs must be available within the system to support cost and pricing data;
- capability to provide a means of measuring the reasonableness of incurred costs;
- capability to identify and accumulate allowable costs by contract or project records that will reconcile with the general ledger; and
- ability to provide supporting documentation of actual expenditures for each billing, based on costs.

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Tuesday, May 26, in the SRS conference room, 6-N, sixth floor, Docking State Office Building, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, to consider the adoption of amendments to an existing rule and regulation on a permanent basis effective July 1, 2009. Telephone conference is not available.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the proposed regulation as stated in K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 77-421. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Susan McDonald, Legal Division, SRS, Room 651-S, Docking State Office Building, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views. It may be necessary to request each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

A summary of the proposed regulation and the economic impact follows:

Article 4.—GA PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY

30-4-90. Eligibility factors specific to the GA program.

This regulation is being amended to make several changes. First, the lifetime maximum to receive general assistance is being reduced from 24 to 18 months, or a time frame to be determined by the secretary based on the level of appropriations. Second, added is the provision that the lifetime maximum shall not apply if the recipient also is receiving Medicaid benefits and meets one of the two conditions set out in (f) (1) and (f) (2). Additionally, the hardship criteria is being eliminated.

Federal Mandate: None.

Economic Impact: The changes contained in this regulation equal a total estimated savings of \$2,886,229.

Bearer of Cost: General assistance consumers impacted by the reduction from 24 to 18 months.

Affected Parties: An average of 1,503 monthly clients will be affected.

Other Methods: Other possible reductions were considered but this was determined the most appropriate to meet the budgetary shortfall.

Proposals will be issued upon request to all prospective bidders who have been prequalified by the Kansas Department of Transportation on the basis of financial condition, available construction equipment and experience. Also, a statement of unearned contracts (Form No. 284) must be filed. There will be no discrimination against anyone because of race, age, religion, color, sex, handicap or national origin in the award of contracts.

Each bidder shall file a sworn statement executed by or on behalf of the person, firm, association or corporation submitting the bid, certifying that such person, firm, association or corporation has not, either directly or indirectly, entered into any agreement, participated in any collusion, or otherwise taken any action in restraint of free competitive bidding in connection with the submitted bid.

This sworn statement shall be in the form of an affidavit executed and sworn to by the bidder before a person who is authorized by the laws of the state to administer oaths. The required form of affidavit will be provided by the state to each prospective bidder. Failure to submit the sworn statement as part of the bid approval package will make the bid nonresponsive and not eligible for award consideration.

Plans and specifications for the projects may be examined at the office of the respective county clerk or at the KDOT district office responsible for the work.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

The State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, June 9, in the board room of the State Education Building, 120 S.E. 10th Ave., Topeka, to consider proposed amendments to teacher licensure regulations 91-1-200, 91-1-202, 91-1-203, 91-1-204, 91-1-205 and 91-1-216. The amendments are being made upon the recommendation of the Professional Standards Advisory Board. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

91-1-200. Definition of terms. This regulation provides the definitions for terms used throughout the regulations. It is being amended to add a definition for the assessment required for a new teacher leader school specialist license. Assessments are required for all initial licenses. Because the board is establishing a new license, the assessment for this license must be defined. No direct economic impact is anticipated for school districts, the state board, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-202. Endorsements. This regulation establishes the endorsements that are available for teaching, school specialist and school leadership licenses. The regulation is amended to provide for a teacher leader endorsement to a professional school specialist license. No direct economic impact is anticipated for school districts, the state board, private businesses or individuals.

91-1-203. Licensure requirements. This regulation establishes the requirements for each type of license issued by the state board. It is being amended to add requirements for a teacher leader school specialist license and a direct entry school counselor program. Amendments to this regulation establish the requirements to qualify for a new teacher leader school specialist professional license. This license provides veteran classroom teachers the opportunity to distinguish career teaching and is an effort to honor and retain the most effective teachers. Amendments also establish the requirements for a direct entry school counselor license. The direct entry path provides a means for individuals who do not have a classroom teaching background to become qualified to be licensed as a school counselor. Requirements for the initial level of license and for moving to the professional level license are provided. This regulation will have no economic impact upon the state board, school districts or private businesses. Individuals seeking either of the proposed licenses will incur costs in completing programs, assessments, and/or other requirements. This is true any time an educator seeks an additional license. However, these are graduate degree school specialist licenses, which will provide access to higher level salaried positions as school specialists.

91-1-204. Licensure of out-of-state and foreign applicants. This regulation establishes the requirements for out-of-state applicants. Amendments provide licensed school counselors from out of state who do not have a teaching background, enhanced access to a Kansas school counselor license. Amendments are made to align requirements for out-of-state applicants for a school

counselor license with the requirements established for in-state applicants. The amendments ensure that requirements are the same for in-state and out-of-state applicants. They provide a pathway for out-of-state school counselors without a teaching background, and allow access to either the initial or professional level license, dependent on the amount of experience as a school counselor. These changes should not have an economic impact on the state board, school districts, other governmental agencies, or private businesses or individuals. There will be an increased supply of qualified school counselors available for employment in Kansas schools.

91-1-205. Licensure renewal requirements. This regulation establishes the requirements for renewal of the various types of licenses issued by the state board. Expanded options to maintain and renew an initial license are provided through amendments. Educators will be allowed to submit professional development points approved through their local professional development council to renew the initial license. The educators would also be allowed to submit credit hours they complete from an approved program in a new license area they are working towards. Finally, undergraduate credit hours related to their license endorsements may be used, where previously only graduate credit hours were applicable. There will be no economic impact upon the state board or school districts.

There would be a savings to licensure applicants under this regulation. Currently licensed educators would potentially save the per credit hour cost of up to four to six semester credit hours of coursework if allowed to submit professional development points for renewal. If renewing on credit hours only, the per credit hour cost of undergraduate versus graduate level coursework would be a significant savings for the educator. Finally, if the educator is working on a new licensure area, the coursework they complete will serve two purposes: renewal of the existing initial license and leading to a new licensure area.

91-1-216. Procedures for promulgation of in-service education plans; approval by state board; area professional development centers' in-service programs. This regulation establishes the procedures for local education agencies to develop and submit their in-service education plan to the state board for approval. A minor amendment extends the timeframe for state board review, approval and notification from 60 days to a full semester. No direct economic impact is anticipated for school districts, the state board, private businesses or individuals.

Such written comments may be

submitted by mail to the secretary of the State Board of Education at the address above or by e-mail to pplamann@ksde.org. The hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures of the State Board of Education.

Topeka Blvd., Topeka, to consider the adoption of one proposed amended rule and regulation, 100-29-16, pertaining to physical therapists', licensed by the Kansas Board of Healing Arts, supervision of physical therapy assistants and support personnel.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the above-referenced rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit comments prior to the hearing to the Board of Healing Arts, 235 S. Topeka Blvd., Topeka, 66603, or by e-mail to healingarts@ksbha.ks.gov. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the regulation during the hearing. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the regulation being considered and the economic impact statement in an accessible format. A summary of the proposed amended rule and regulation to be considered at the hearing and the economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 100-29-16. Supervision of physical therapy assistants and support personnel. This regulation regulates physical therapists' supervision of physical therapy assistants and support personnel. The amendment allows for a physical therapist to supervise more than four physical therapist assistants in limited circumstances.

The amendment to K.A.R. 100-29-16 will not result in any economic impact to the public or licensees.

The regulation is not mandated by any federal law.

No other methods were considered.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 16.—CANCER DRUG REPOSITORY PROGRAM

68-16-3. Donation of cancer drugs. (a) Only a cancer drug that meets the following conditions may be accepted:

- (1) The drug has not been compounded.
(2) The drug has not been previously dispensed from a cancer drug repository.
(3) The drug's packaging includes the drug's lot number and expiration date.

(b) Any cancer drug may be accepted only if the donor simultaneously provides the cancer drug repository with a completed cancer drug repository donor form signed by the person making the donation.

(c) A cancer drug repository shall not accept the donation of any controlled substance or any drug that can be dispensed only to a patient registered with the drug manufacturer.

(d) Each cancer drug repository shall receive donated drugs only at the premises of that cancer drug repository and only by an individual authorized by the repository to receive donated cancer drugs.

(e) Each cancer drug donated under the cancer drug repository program shall be stored in a secure storage area under environmental conditions appropriate for the drugs being stored.

Article 19.—CONTINUOUS QUALITY ASSURANCE PROGRAMS

68-19-1. Minimum program requirements. Each pharmacy's continuous quality improvement program shall meet the following minimum requirements:

- (a) Meet at least once each quarter of each calendar year;
(b) have the pharmacy's pharmacist in charge in attendance at each meeting; and
(c) perform the following during each meeting:
(1) Review all incident reports generated for each reportable event associated with that pharmacy since the last quarterly meeting;
(2) for each incident report reviewed, establish the steps taken or to be taken to prevent a recurrence of the incident; and
(3) create a report of the meeting, including at least the following information:
(A) A list of the persons in attendance;
(B) a list of the incident reports reviewed; and
(C) a description of the steps taken or to be taken to prevent a recurrence of each incident reviewed.

111-5-170. Name of promotion; rules and regulations. In conjunction with the multi-state lottery association and the interstate agreement creating a multi-state lottery as provided by K.S.A. 74-8731, and amendments thereto, the Kansas lottery shall conduct a drawing promotion entitled, "Kansas Hot Lotto Sizzler \$100,000 Cash Blast Promotion," and will accept entries starting February 1, 2009, for the drawing to be conducted on March 4, 2009. Rules applicable to this promotion are contained in 111-5-170 through 111-5-174 and 111-6-1 *et seq.* (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-27-09, Jan. 14, 2009.)

111-5-171. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Kansas Hot Lotto Sizzler \$100,000 Cash Blast" promotion:

(a) "Drawing" means the formal process of selecting entries that determines which participants are entitled to win the prizes set forth in these rules.

(b) "MUSL" means the multi-state lottery association, a government-benefit association wholly owned and operated by the party lotteries.

(c) "Member lottery" means a state lottery which has joined the MUSL and, in the context of the "Hot Lotto" rules, has joined in said game promotion.

The grand prize winner shall be selected from among all entries received from all member lottery jurisdictions selling Hot Lotto tickets. Forty secondary prize winners will be selected from each participating member lottery jurisdiction. Each secondary prize winner will receive a \$500 cash prize.

(b) All prizes are subject to lottery validation, set-offs and deductions authorized by law.

(c) The winner of a prize as the result of the said drawing shall present to the lottery a completed claim form as provided by the lottery, along with the signed, non-winning ticket whereon printed is the ticket number that was randomly selected as a winner in the drawing, within 30 days of the date his or her entry was drawn or the person named on the entry drawn will no longer be eligible for the prize. In such an event, the first eligible alternate entry drawn pursuant to subsection 111-5-174 shall be declared the winner. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-27-09, Jan. 14, 2009.)

111-5-173. Method of entry. (a) Entry into the "Kansas Hot Lotto Sizzler \$100,000 Cash Blast Promotion" shall be accomplished as follows:

(1) Purchase a valid single \$4.00 or more Kansas Hot Lotto with sizzler ticket beginning at 5:00 a.m. on February 1, 2009, and ending at the close of business as defined in subsection (p) of 111-6-1, on February 28, 2009.

(2) Determine if the ticket is a winning ticket in accordance with the rules of said Hot Lotto online game. If the ticket is a winning ticket, it is not eligible for the drawing and shall be redeemed in accordance with the online game rules.

(3) If the ticket is a valid non-winning ticket, the ticket is qualified for the drawing and the holder of the ticket may use it to enter the drawing.

(4) Beginning with the sale of tickets on February 1, 2009, through noon central time on March 4, 2009, the holder of a qualifying ticket may only enter the drawing by completing and submitting the web entry form electronically.

(5) The electronic web entry form shall be built and supported by the Multi-State Lottery Association, who shall provide a link to the Kansas Lottery's website. (8) To enter the electronic web entry form into the drawing, the player must submit the completed web entry form electronically by clicking on the "SUBMIT" icon located on the web entry form.

(9) The qualifying ticket must be retained by the entrant in order to claim a winning prize identified in 111-5-172. A player who does not retain his or her qualifying ticket forfeits any prize for which that ticket is drawn and another winner will be drawn for that prize.

(10) Only one online entry per qualifying ticket purchased shall be eligible for entry into the drawing.

111-5-174. Selection of winners. (a) Selection of the winners in the "Kansas Hot Lotto Sizzler \$100,000 Cash Blast Promotion" shall be accomplished in accordance with the rules and regulations established and set forth by the Multi-State Lottery Association for this drawing.

(b) The drawings shall be conducted sometime after noon central time on March 4, 2009.

(c) The drawings shall be conducted under the supervision of the MUSL drawing manager and an independent auditor.

(d) The drawings shall be videotaped.

(e) The drawings shall be open to the public and may be attended by contacting the Multi-State Lottery Association prior to the drawings.

(f) The drawing shall be conducted using a random number generator to select one grand prize winner from all entries received from all member lottery jurisdictions selling Hot Lotto tickets. A random number generator shall be used to select 40 secondary prize winners in each member lottery jurisdiction selling Hot Lotto. After the grand prize winner and secondary prize winners have

been selected, five additional entries shall be drawn for the grand prize and shall be used as alternate winners if any of the originally selected winning entries are non-qualifying, if a player cannot present a winning ticket, or if a player otherwise fails to properly claim a prize. SENATE BILL No. 14

AN ACT concerning the interstate compact for juveniles; relating to the compact administrator; establishing the Kansas council for interstate juvenile supervision.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. The governor shall designate an officer who shall be the interstate compact for juveniles compact administrator. The compact administrator shall serve subject to the pleasure of the governor. The compact administrator shall cooperate with all departments, agencies and officers of this state and its subdivisions in facilitating the proper administration of the compact or of any supplementary agreement or agreements entered into by this state hereunder.

Sec. 2. (a) There is hereby established the Kansas council for interstate juvenile supervision. The council shall consist of the following members:

- (1) The interstate compact for juveniles compact administrator or the compact administrator's designee;
- (2) the chief justice of the supreme court or the chief justice's designee;
- (3) the attorney general or the attorney general's designee;
- (4) a person representing crime victims groups appointed by the attorney general;
- (5) the commissioner of the juvenile justice authority or the commissioner's designee;
- (6) one member of the house of representatives appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives; and
- (7) one member of the senate appointed by the president of the senate.

(b) The appointments shall be made within 30 days after the effective date of this act. The initial meeting of the council shall be convened within 60 days after the effective date of this act by the commissioner of juvenile justice at a time and place designated by the commissioner of juvenile justice. The council shall elect a chairperson and may elect any additional officers from among its members necessary to discharge its duties.

(c) Meetings of the council subsequent to its initial meeting shall be held and conducted in accordance with policies and procedures established by the council.

(d) The council shall meet upon call of its chairperson as necessary to carry out its duties under this act.

(e) Each member of the council appointed by the chief justice or the attorney general shall be appointed for a term of four years. All other members shall be appointed for a term of two years and shall continue to serve during that time as long as the member occupies the position which made the member eligible for the appointment. Each member shall continue in office until a successor is appointed and qualifies. Members shall be eligible for reappointment, and appointment may be made to fill an unexpired term.

(f) The council shall oversee and administer the state's participation in the interstate compact for juveniles, K.S.A. 38-1008, and amendments thereto, and shall develop policies concerning the operations and procedures of the compact within the state.

(g) Each member of the council shall receive compensation, subsistence allowances, mileage and other expenses as provided

for in K.S.A. 75-3223, and amendments thereto, for each day or part thereof actually spent on council activities.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

SENATE BILL No. 219

AN ACT concerning retirement and pensions; relating to the Kansas public employees retirement system; death and disability benefits; employer contributions; amending K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-4927 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-4927 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-4927. (1) The board may establish a plan of death and long-term disability benefits to be paid to the members of the retirement system as provided by this section. The long-term disability benefit shall be payable in accordance with the terms of such plan as established by the board, except that for any member who is disabled prior to the effective date of this act, the annual disability benefit amount shall be an amount equal to 66⅔% of the member's annual rate of compensation on the date such disability commenced. Such plan shall provide that:

(A) For deaths occurring prior to January 1, 1987, the right to receive such death benefit shall cease upon the member's attainment of age 70 or date of retirement whichever first occurs. The right to receive such long-term disability benefit shall cease (i) for a member who becomes eligible for such benefit before attaining age 60, upon the date that such member attains age 65 or the date of such member's retirement, whichever first occurs, and (ii) for a member who becomes eligible for such benefit at or after attaining age 60, the date that such member has received such benefit for a period of five years, or upon the date of such member's retirement, whichever first occurs.

(B) Long-term disability benefit payments shall be in lieu of any accidental total disability benefit that a member may be eligible to receive under subsection (3) of K.S.A. 74-4916 and amendments thereto. The member must make an initial application for social security disability benefits and, if denied such benefits, the member must pursue and exhaust all administrative remedies of the social security administration which include, but are not limited to, reconsideration and hearings. Such plan may provide that any amount which a member receives as a social security benefit or a disability benefit or compensation from any source by reason of any employment including, but not limited to, workers compensation benefits may be deducted from the amount of long-term disability benefit payments under such plan. However, in no event shall the amount of long-term disability benefit payments under such plan be reduced by any amounts a member receives as a supplemental disability benefit or compensation from any source by reason of the member's employment, provided such supplemental disability benefit or compensation is based solely upon the portion of the member's monthly compensation that exceeds the maximum monthly compensation taken into account under such plan. As used in this paragraph, "maximum monthly compensation" means the dollar amount that results from dividing the maximum monthly disability benefit payable under such plan by the percentage of compensation that is used to calculate disability benefit payments under such plan. During the period in which such member is pursuing such administrative remedies prior to a final decision of the social security administration, social security disability benefits may be estimated and may be deducted from the amount of long-term disability benefit payments under such plan. If the social security benefit, workers compensation benefit, other income or wages or other disability benefit by reason of employment other than a supplemental benefit based solely on compensation in excess of the maximum monthly compensation taken into account under such plan, or any part thereof, is paid in a lump-sum, the amount of the reduction shall be calculated on a monthly basis over the period of time for which the lump-sum is given. As used in

(continued)

this section, "workers compensation benefits" means the total award of disability benefit payments under the workers compensation act notwithstanding any payment of attorney fees from such benefits as provided in the workers compensation act.

(C) The plan may include other provisions relating to qualifications for benefits; schedules and graduation of benefits; limitations of eligibility for benefits by reason of termination of employment or membership; conversion privileges; limitations of eligibility for benefits by reason of leaves of absence, military service or other interruptions in service; limitations on the condition of long-term disability benefit payment by reason of improved health; requirements for medical examinations or reports; or any other reasonable provisions as established by rule and regulation of uniform application adopted by the board.

(D) Any visually impaired person who is in training at and employed by a sheltered workshop for the blind operated by the secretary of social and rehabilitation services and who would otherwise be eligible for the long-term disability benefit as described in this section shall not be eligible to receive such benefit due to visual impairment as such impairment shall be determined to be a preexisting condition.

(2) (A) In the event that a member becomes eligible for a long-term disability benefit under the plan authorized by this section such member shall be given participating service credit for the entire period of such disability. Such member's final average salary shall be computed in accordance with subsection (17) of K.S.A. 74-4902 and amendments thereto except that the years of participating service used in such computation shall be the years of salaried participating service.

(B) In the event that a member eligible for a long-term disability benefit under the plan authorized by this section shall be disabled for a period of five years or more immediately preceding retirement, such member's final average salary shall be adjusted upon retirement by the actuarial salary assumption rates in existence during such period of disability. Effective July 1, 1993, such member's final average salary shall be adjusted upon retirement by 5% for each year of disability after July 1, 1993, but before July 1, 1998. Effective July 1, 1998, such member's final average salary shall be adjusted upon retirement by an amount equal to the lesser of: (i) The percentage increase in the consumer price index for all urban consumers as published by the bureau of labor statistics of the United States department of labor minus 1%; or (ii) four percent per annum, measured from the member's last day on the payroll to the month that is two months prior to the month of retirement, for each year of disability after July 1, 1998.

(C) In the event that a member eligible for a long-term disability benefit under the plan authorized by this section shall be disabled for a period of five years or more immediately preceding death, such member's current annual rate shall be adjusted by the actuarial salary assumption rates in existence during such period of disability. Effective July 1, 1993, such member's current annual rate shall be adjusted upon death by 5% for each year of disability after July 1, 1993, but before July 1, 1998. Effective July 1, 1998, such member's current annual rate shall be adjusted upon death by an amount equal to the lesser of: (i) The percentage increase in the consumer price index for all urban consumers published by the bureau of labor statistics of the United States department of labor minus 1%; or (ii) four percent per annum, measured from the member's last day on the payroll to the month that is two months prior to the month of death, for each year of disability after July 1, 1998.

(3) (A) To carry out the legislative intent to provide, within the funds made available therefor, the broadest possible coverage for members who are in active employment or involuntarily absent from such active employment, the plan of death and long-term disability benefits shall be subject to adjustment from time to time by the board within the limitations of this section. The plan may include terms and provisions which are consistent with the terms and provisions of group life and long-term disability policies usually issued to those employers who employ a large number of employees. The board shall have the authority to establish and adjust from time to time the procedures for financing and administering the plan of death and long-term disability benefits authorized by this section. Either the insured death benefit or the insured disability benefit or both such benefits may be financed directly by the system or by one or more insurance companies authorized and

licensed to transact group life and group accident and health insurance in this state.

(B) The board may contract with one or more insurance companies, which are authorized and licensed to transact group life and group accident and health insurance in Kansas, to underwrite or to administer or to both underwrite and administer either the insured death benefit or the long-term disability benefit or both such benefits. Each such contract with an insurance company under this subsection shall be entered into on the basis of competitive bids solicited and administered by the board. Such competitive bids shall be based on specifications prepared by the board.

(i) In the event the board purchases one or more policies of group insurance from such company or companies to provide either the insured death benefit or the long-term disability benefit or both such benefits, the board shall have the authority to subsequently cancel one or more of such policies and, notwithstanding any other provision of law, to release each company which issued any such canceled policy from any liability for future benefits under any such policy and to have the reserves established by such company under any such canceled policy returned to the system for deposit in the group insurance reserve of the fund.

(ii) In addition, the board shall have the authority to cancel any policy or policies of group life and long-term disability insurance in existence on the effective date of this act and, notwithstanding any other provision of law, to release each company which issued any such canceled policy from any liability for future benefits under any such policy and to have the reserves established by such company under any such canceled policy returned to the system for deposit in the group insurance reserve of the fund. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no premium tax shall be due or payable by any such company or companies on any such policy or policies purchased by the board nor shall any brokerage fees or commissions be paid thereon.

(4) (A) There is hereby created in the state treasury the group insurance reserve fund. Investment income of the fund shall be added or credited to the fund as provided by law. The cost of the plan of death and long-term disability benefits shall be paid from the group insurance reserve fund, which shall be administered by the board. Except as otherwise provided by this subsection, for the period commencing July 1, 2005, and ending June 30, 2006, each participating employer shall appropriate and pay to the system in such manner as the board shall prescribe in addition to the employee and employer retirement contributions an amount equal to .8% of the amount of compensation on which the members' contributions to the Kansas public employees retirement system are based for deposit in the group insurance reserve fund. For the period commencing July 1, 2006, and all periods thereafter, each participating employer shall appropriate and pay to the system in such manner as the board shall prescribe in addition to the employee and employer retirement contributions an amount equal to 1.0% of the amount of compensation on which the members' contributions to the Kansas public employees retirement system are based for deposit in the group insurance reserve fund. Notwithstanding the provisions of this subsection, no participating employer shall appropriate and pay to the system any amount provided for by this subsection for deposit in the group insurance reserve fund for the period commencing on ~~April 1, 2000, and ending on December 31, 2001, for the period commencing July 1, 2002, and ending December 31, 2002, or for the period commencing April 1, 2003, and ending on June 30, 2004~~ March 1, 2009, and ending on November 30, 2009.

(B) The director of the budget and the governor shall include in the budget and in the budget request for appropriations for personal services a sum to pay the state's contribution to the group insurance reserve fund as provided by this section and shall present the same to the legislature for allowances and appropriation.

(C) The provisions of subsection (4) of K.S.A. 74-4920 and amendments thereto shall apply for the purpose of providing the funds to make the contributions to be deposited to the group insurance reserve fund.

(D) Any dividend or retrospective rate credit allowed by an insurance company or companies shall be credited to the group insurance reserve fund and the board may take such amounts into consideration in determining the amounts of the benefits under the plan authorized by this section.

(5) The death benefit provided under the plan of death and long-term disability benefits authorized by this section shall be known and referred to as insured death benefit. The long-term disability benefit provided under the plan of death and long-term disability benefits authorized by this section shall be known and referred to as long-term disability benefit.

(6) The board is hereby authorized to establish an optional death benefit plan for employees and spouses and dependents of employees. Except as provided in subsection (7), such optional death benefit plan shall be made available to all employees who are covered or may hereafter become covered by the plan of death and long-term disability benefits authorized by this section. The cost of the optional death benefit plan shall be paid by the applicant either by means of a system of payroll deductions or direct payment to the board. The board shall have the authority and discretion to establish such terms, conditions, specifications and coverages as it may deem to be in the best interest of the state of Kansas and its employees which should include term death benefits for the person's period of active state employment regardless of age, but in no case, shall the maximum allowable coverage be less than \$200,000. The cost of the optional death benefit plan shall not be established on such a basis as to unreasonably discriminate against any particular age group. The board shall have full administrative responsibility, discretion and authority to establish and continue such optional death benefit plan and the director of accounts and reports of the department of administration shall when requested by the board and from funds appropriated or available for such purpose establish a system to make periodic deductions from state payrolls to cover the cost of the optional death benefit plan coverage under the provisions of this subsection (6) and shall remit all deductions together with appropriate accounting reports to the system. There is hereby created in the state treasury the optional

death benefit plan reserve fund. Investment income of the fund shall be added or credited to the fund as provided by law. All funds received by the board, whether in the form of direct payments, payroll deductions or otherwise, shall be accounted for separately from all other funds of the retirement system and shall be paid into the optional death benefit plan reserve fund, from which the board is authorized to make the appropriate payments and to pay the ongoing costs of administration of such optional death benefit plan as may be incurred in carrying out the provisions of this subsection (6).

(7) Any employer other than the state of Kansas which is currently a participating employer of the Kansas public employees retirement system or is in the process of affiliating with the Kansas public employees retirement system may also elect to affiliate for the purposes of subsection (6). All such employers shall make application for affiliation with such system, to be effective on January 1 or July 1 next following application.

(8) For purposes of the death benefit provided under the plan of death and long-term disability benefits authorized by this section and the optional death benefit plan authorized by subsection (6), commencing on the effective date of this act, in the case of medical or financial hardship of the member as determined by the executive director, or otherwise commencing January 1, 2005, the member may name a beneficiary or beneficiaries other than the beneficiary or beneficiaries named by the member to receive other benefits as provided by the provisions of K.S.A. 74-4901 et seq., and amendments thereto.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-4927 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.
