Proposals will be issued upon request to all prospective bidders who have been prequalified by the Kansas Department of Transportation on the basis of financial condition, available construction equipment and experience. Also, a statement of unearned contracts (Form No. 284) must be filed. There will be no discrimination against anyone because of race, age, religion, color, sex, handicap or national origin in the award of contracts.

Each bidder shall file a sworn statement executed by or on behalf of the person, firm, association or corporation submitting the bid, certifying that such person, firm, association or corporation has not, either directly or indirectly, entered into any agreement, participated in any collusion, or otherwise taken any action in restraint of free competitive bidding in connection with the submitted bid.

This sworn statement shall be in the form of an affidavit executed and sworn to by the bidder before a person who is authorized by the laws of the state to administer oaths. The required form of affidavit will be provided by the state to each prospective bidder. Failure to submit the sworn statement as part of the bid approval package will make the bid nonresponsive and not eligible for award consideration.

Request for Applications

The Kansas Housing Resources Corporation announces the release of a Request for Applications (RFA) for the Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-housing Program (HPRP). KHRC is making available approximately \$8.3 million in HPRP funds for a 30-month period.

The RFA is issued pursuant to the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, signed by President Obama February 19, 2009. The complete HPRP can be viewed at http://www.hudhre.info/hprp. Through the Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-housing Program, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has been authorized by Congress to dedicate funds for homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing activities, including short-term or medium-term rental assistance, housing relocation and stabilization services, mediation, credit counseling, security or utility deposits, utility payments, moving cost assistance, case management, or other appropriate activities for homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing of persons that have be-

come homeless. Contracts awarded under this program are 100 percent federal and have a Catalog of Federal Assistance (CFDA) number of 14.257.

KHRC is requesting applications from local municipalities (cities and/or counties) that could include not-for-profit corporations and charitable or faith-based organizations to be considered for funding through the Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-housing Program. Awards will be determined through an application review process.

KHRC also is requesting applications for not-for-profit organizations to provide HPRP services statewide. Not-for-profit organizations applying directly to KHRC for funding under this program would need to demonstrate the ability to either completely provide or collaborate with other agencies to provide all HPRP-related services on a statewide level.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Thursday, September 24, in the Board of Regents' boardroom, Suite 520, Curtis State Office Building, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of two new rules and regulations and the amendment of 10 other regulations relating to qualified admissions.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Julene Miller, Kansas Board of Regents, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 520, Topeka, 66612-1368. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Renee Burlingham at (785) 296-3689.

Copies of the regulations and the economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting Renee Burlingham. A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows:

Article 29.—QUALIFIED ADMISSION

K.A.R. 88-29-1 defines key terms for the regulations. The proposed amendments define the following new terms: "admission category," "non-accredited private secondary school," ten percent exception window for resident transfer admissions," and "ten percent exception window for nonresident transfer admissions."

K.A.R. 88-29-4 establishes the minimum requirements for the admission of students who have 24 or more transferable credit hours. The proposed amendment to this regulation provides that transfer students who do not meet the statutory qualifications for admission can be admitted through one of the new transfer admissions exceptions windows.

K.A.R. 88-29-5 establishes minimum admission standards for Kansas residents under age 21, but who do not have 24 or more transferable credit hours. The proposed amendment provides that students who do not meet these minimum admission standards may be admitted by means of the exceptions window for resident freshmen.

K.A.R. 88-29-7 establishes minimum admission standards for nonresidents. The proposed amendment provides for admission of nonresident freshmen who graduated from non-accredited schools if they achieve a composite score of 21 or higher on the ACT.

K.A.R. 88-29-8 describes how universities shall calculate the size of the "ten percent exception window for resident freshman class admissions," which is a method to admit a limited number of residents who do not meet minimum admission standards. The proposed amend-

ment clarifies that only resident freshmen may be admitted using this exceptions window; resident and nonresident transfer students would need to be admitted by means of the resident or nonresident transfer admissions exceptions windows.

Proposed K.A.R. 88-29-8a is a new regulation that would implement the statutory amendment allowing for use of an exceptions window for resident transfer students who do not meet the statutory qualifications for transfer admissions. The proposed regulation is patterned after K.A.R. 88-29-8 in terms of how the ten percent maximum is calculated.

Proposed **K.A.R. 88-29-8b** is a new regulation that would implement the statutory amendment allowing for use of an exceptions window for nonresident transfer students who do not meet the statutory qualifications for transfer admissions. The proposed regulation is patterned after K.A.R. 88-29-8 in terms of how the ten percent maximum is calculated.

K.A.R. 88-29-9 requires state universities to adopt admission policies, which are subject to board approval. The proposed amendment recognizes the new exceptions windows as well as allows each state educational institution to set its own qualifications for exiting the conditional admission category.

K.A.R. 88-29-11 establishes minimum requirements for a high school's QA precollege curriculum. The proposed amendment eliminates the requirement for one unit of computer technology for students graduating from high school in 2010 or thereafter, allows qualified admissions math courses completed in the seventh or eighth grade to count toward the QA precollege curriculum math requirement and, for students graduating in 2014 or later, requires that at least one QA math course must be completed in the senior year of high school.

K.A.R. 88-29-12 establishes a process by which accredited Kansas high schools can establish an approved QA precollege curriculum. The proposed amendment eliminates the requirement for a qualified admission computer technology course.

K.A.R. 88-29-18 establishes functional equivalents of the QA precollege curriculum for Kansas residents. The proposed amendment eliminates reference to a qualified admission computer technology course.

K.A.R. 88-29-19 establishes functional equivalents of the QA precollege curriculum for nonresidents. The proposed amendment eliminates reference to a qualified admission computer technology course.

Economic Impact: The adoption of these regulations would result in no economic impact on the board, governmental agencies or the general public. Further, there is no anticipated economic impact on the state universities or high schools. Although processes may change slightly with these regulation amendments, state universities already evaluate each application for admission, and high schools already develop curriculum for their precollege courses.

Constitution of the State of Kansas—Legislative; Kansas Home Inspectors Professional Competence and Financial Responsibility Act; Registration Requirement of Membership in Nationally Recognized Organization; Unlawful Delegation of Legislative Authority to Private Organization.

Personal and Real Property—Kansas Home Inspectors Professional Competence and Financial Responsibility Act; Effective Date of Liability Disclaimer and Limitation of Liability for Damages. Jeff Barnes, Chair, Kansas Home Inspectors Registration Board, Mulvane, February 11, 2009.

The Kansas Home Inspectors Professional Competence and Financial Responsibility Act (the Act) became effective on July 1, 2008. However, registration of home inspectors cannot occur before July 1, 2009. Therefore, requirements that registered home inspectors conduct inspections in accordance with the "reasonably prudent home inspector" standard of care and provide completed pre-inspection notification do not apply until the individ-

ual is registered. However, the Act's provisions relating to liability disclaimers and limitations apply to all home inspectors regardless of registration status. The 12-month statute of limitation also applies to all home inspections regardless of registration status.

K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 58-4511 makes performance of home inspections without being registered or exempt from registration a class A nonperson misdemeanor. The county or district attorney in the county or district where an offense occurred would have jurisdiction to file such a misdemeanor charge, a decision that is within the discretion of the appropriate county or district attorney.

The registration requirement of membership in a nationally recognized home inspection society, association or organization impermissibly delegates legislative authority to a nongovernmental entity in violation of Article 2, § 1 of the Kansas Constitution. Article 11, Section 9, of the Kansas Constitution provides that, with certain exceptions, the State "shall never be a party in carrying on any work of internal improvement." A "work of internal improvement" involves construction of a permanent fixed structure or a permanent alteration of real property for the benefit of the general public. A contract between the Kansas Department of Commerce and the National Association of State Workforce Agencies to provide computer software that collects, stores, and disseminates workforce and labor data and to train the employees of state workforce development agencies does not violate Article 11, Section 9. Additionally, in light of the broad discretion accorded by the Kansas appellate courts to the Legislature in determining whether public funds are being used for a public purpose and the fact that the Legislature has authorized the Secretary of Commerce to contract for data processing services and training, the public purpose doctrine is not violated.
