Executive Order 11-26
Conditional and Temporary Relief from
Motor Carrier Rules and Regulations

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 48-925(b) provides that the Governor may issue orders and proclamations which shall have the force and effect of law under subsection (b) of K.S.A. 48-924; and

WHEREAS, on the 29th day of July, 2011, I declared a state of regional emergency for Atchison, Doniphan, Leavenworth, and Wyandotte counties as a result of flooding; and

WHEREAS, this disaster has caused or threatens to cause an emergency as defined in 49 C.F.R. 390.5, as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-3f and which has or threatens to interrupt the delivery of essential services or essential supplies or otherwise immediately threatens physical harm or injury to persons, the public welfare and/or substantial damage to property; and

WHEREAS, conditions exists which require the operation of motor carriers and drivers of commercial motor vehicles for the purposes of providing direct assistance to supplement State and local efforts in the restoration of services and relief in the affected area(s) of the State of Kansas.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby declare there is a state of regional emergency existing in the above-listed counties, and as a result, it is necessary to expedite all efforts of restoration of services and relief. In order to accommodate this need and to provide assistance

to the citizens of Kansas in this emergency situation, I hereby order the following:

1. This declaration only applies to those motor carriers and persons operating commercial motor vehicles and directly participating in the restoration and relief efforts; and
2. in accordance with Title 49 C.F.R. § 390.23, the requirements contained in the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations, Title 49 C.F.R. Parts 390-399 are hereby suspended through the duration of the motor carrier's assistance in the disaster relief effort not to exceed a period of thirty (30) days from the date of the initial declaration unless the order is rescinded or expanded by executive order or concurrent resolution of the legislature; and
3. all other applicable state and federal regulations shall apply to include but not limited to: Title 49 C.F.R. Part 382, Controlled Substances and Alcohol Use and Testing; the Kansas Motor Vehicle Driver's License Act, K.S.A. 8-234 et seq. and Title 49 C.F.R. Part 383 Commercial Driver's License Standards as adopted by the Kansas Uniform Commercial Drivers' License Act, K.S.A. 8-2,125 et seq., the federal Minimum Levels of Financial Responsibility (insurance requirements) Title 49 C.F.R. Part 387 as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-3n and state insurance requirements as provided in K.A.R. 82-4-23; and, adherence to the regulations governing the Transportation of Hazardous Materials as provided Title 49 C.F.R. 397 and adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-3k and Parts: 107, 171-173, 177, 178 and 180 as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-20; and
4. the registration and fuel tax permits as enforced by the Kansas Department of Revenue are temporarily suspended; and
5. the licensing, certification and permitting rules and regulations as required by the Kansas Corporation Commission are temporarily suspended; and
6. participating motor carriers must still obtain the requisite over dimension/overweight permits as required by the Kansas Department of Transportation prior to operating; however, the fees associated with these permits are temporarily waived. Additionally, motor carriers and persons participating in restoration and recovery efforts will receive priority service and may operate during low visibility, night, holiday and curfew hours if the carriers and/or driver use clearance lights and/or escort vehicles.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 11-26 and shall become effective immediately.

Executive Order 11-27

WHEREAS, the Director of the Kansas Water Office has informed me, pursuant to K.S.A. 74-2608, of the drought conditions within the state; and

WHEREAS, there is every indication that the present drought conditions will not abate in the near future; and

WHEREAS, these drought conditions may become more severe; and

WHEREAS, the affected areas and severity have changed; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Emergency Management Act (K.S.A. 48-924 et seq.) states that the Governor shall be responsible for meeting the dangers to the state and its people from disasters, including drought.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby:

1. declare a Drought Watch, Drought Warning or Drought Emergency for the counties below replacing Executive Order 11-18;
2. and authorize and direct all agencies under the jurisdiction of the Governor to implement the appropriate Watch, Warning or Emergency level drought response actions assigned to them in the Operations Plan of the Governor's Drought Response Team.

Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. Abengoa Bioenergy Biomass of Kansas, LLC (ABBK), located at 16150 Main Circle Drive, Suite 200, Chesterfield, Missouri, has applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to construct a biomass-to-ethanol manufacturing and biomass-to-energy facility in Section 18, Township 33 South, Range 37 West, Stevens County, Kansas, near Hugoton. Emission of particulate matter (PM), PM equal to or less than 10 microns in diameter (PM₁₀), PM equal to or less than 2.5 microns in diameter (PM_{2.5}), volatile organic compounds (VOCs), oxides of nitrogen (NO_x), sulfur dioxide (SO₂), carbon monoxide (CO), hazardous air pollutants (HAPs) and greenhouse gases (GHGs) were evaluated during the permit review process.

The proposed permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, prevention of significant deterioration (PSD), which adopt the federal standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attainment areas are areas where the air quality meets or exceeds the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS).

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each regulated pollutant, including greenhouse gases (GHGs), for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to affect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each regulated pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the proposed ABBK project indicates that the emission rate of oxides of nitrogen, sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, particulate matter and GHGs all exceed the significance levels. ABBK conducted the required BACT analyses. KDHE has reviewed ABBK's BACT analyses and concurs with its findings that for the biomass-fired stoker boiler, rated at 500 MMBtu/hr maximum design heating input, selective catalytic reduction is BACT for NO_x; the injection of sorbent (trona (sodium sesquicarbonate) or lime) in combination with a dry flue gas desulfurization (dry FGD) system is BACT for SO₂; good combustion practices (GCP) is BACT for carbon monoxide (CO) emissions; fabric filters is BACT for PM, PM₁₀ and PM_{2.5}; and energy efficient design, incorporating cogeneration, process integration, combustion of co-products and heat recovery, is BACT for GHGs.

An ambient impact analysis was performed on the potential air emissions of NO₂, SO₂, PM₁₀, PM_{2.5} and CO from this project.

- Detailed modeling for the annual NO₂ averaging period demonstrated no significant impact of the an-

nual ambient air quality standard and demonstrated that 9.3% of the annual Class II maximum allowable increment for NO₂ is expected to be consumed. Subsequent detailed modeling for the 1-hour NO₂ ambient air quality standard demonstrated that the planned source will not contribute significantly to any modeled ambient air quality violation. The EPA has not established a 1-hour Class II maximum allowable increment for NO₂. Accordingly, no calculation of the potential consumption of such increment is possible.

- The SO₂ screening modeling demonstrated no significant impact on the 3-hour ambient air quality standard and 4.1% of the Class II maximum allowable increment is expected to be consumed. Detailed modeling for SO₂ demonstrated that the emissions from the planned source will not cause or contribute to any violation of the 1-hour, 24-hour or annual ambient air quality standard and that 10.7% of the 24-hour and 6.2% of the annual Class II maximum allowable increments for SO₂ are expected to be consumed. The EPA has not established a 1-hour Class II maximum allowable increment for SO₂. Accordingly, no calculation of the potential consumption of such increment is possible.
- Detailed modeling for PM₁₀ demonstrated that the emissions will not cause or contribute to any violation of the 24-hour or annual ambient air quality standard and that 91.5% of the 24-hour and 41.5% of the annual Class II maximum allowable increments for PM₁₀ are expected to be consumed.
- Detailed modeling for PM_{2.5} demonstrates that the emissions will not cause or contribute to any violation of the annual ambient air quality standard and that 54.6% of the annual Class II maximum allowable increment for PM_{2.5} is expected to be consumed. Subsequent detailed modeling for the 24-hour PM_{2.5} ambient air quality standard demonstrated that the planned source will not contribute significantly to any modeled ambient air quality violation and that 92.3% of the 24-hour Class II maximum allowable increment for PM_{2.5} is expected to be consumed.
- The CO screening modeling analysis demonstrated no significant impact on the 1-hour or 8-hour ambient air quality and that the emissions would not cause or contribute to any violation of ambient air standards. The EPA has not established any Class II maximum allowable increments for CO. Accordingly, no calculation of the potential consumption of such increment is possible.

An analysis of visibility was conducted for the Cimarron National Grasslands and the Hugoton Municipal Airport. The VISCREEN model results indicate no adverse impacts at Cimarron National Grasslands. The VISCREEN model results indicated minimal visibility impacts at Hugoton Municipal Airport. No adverse impacts on soils and vegetation in the area are expected. Any federal land manager who has reason to believe they may have a Class I area adversely impacted by the emissions from the proposed project has the opportunity to present KDHE with a demonstration of the adverse impact on the

air quality-related values of the federal Class I area during the comment period.

A public comment period has been established until noon September 12 to allow citizens the opportunity to express any concerns they may have about this proposed permitting action. All comments should be submitted in writing to Terry T. Tavener, KDHE, Bureau of Air, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, 66612-1366, or presented at the tentatively scheduled public hearing (see below).

Any member of the public may request a public hearing be conducted to receive comments on the proposed issuance of the draft air quality construction permit. Written request to hold a public hearing should be sent to the attention of Sharon Burrell at the address above or by fax to (785) 291-3953 and must be received by noon September 12. If a request is received, a public hearing is tentatively scheduled by KDHE from 5 to 8 p.m. September 13 at the Stevens County Memorial Hall, 200 E. 6th St., Hugoton. If no requests to hold the public hearing are received by noon September 12, the public hearing will be cancelled. A notice of the cancellation will be posted at the KDHE website at http://www.kdheks.gov/bar/public_notice.html.

If a hearing is conducted, all interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally or by submission of written materials during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit oral presentations to a specific time limit.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed materials in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation must be made not later than August 26 by contacting Sharon Burrell at (785) 296-0297.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation and all information relied upon during the permit application review process for the PSD is available for public review for a period of 30 days from the date of publication during normal business hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., at the KDHE, Bureau of Air, 1000 S.W. Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Region VII have received Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) hazardous waste Part A and Part B permit renewal applications from the United States Department of the Army Fort Riley Military Installation (Fort Riley), located at 407 Pershing Court, Fort Riley, Kansas. KDHE and the EPA are providing notice of their intent to renew a jointly issued RCRA hazardous waste storage permit for closure to Fort Riley, the owner of the facility.

The facility was originally permitted to store hazardous wastes in 1998 and assigned EPA identification number KS6214020756. The facility has submitted the necessary applications for the renewal of its permit; however, since that time the facility has begun closing. The permit to be issued will cover closure only and will not authorize Fort Riley to store or treat hazardous waste. In addition to the hazardous waste storage facility (HWSF), the permit also will address the closure requirements of an interim status open burning open detonation (OB/OD) unit that Fort Riley currently operates under the Military Munitions Rule of 40 CFR 266 Subpart M.

In October 1985, the state of Kansas received final authorization from the EPA to implement its own hazardous waste management program in lieu of the federal program except for the portions covered by the Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments (HSWA) of 1984. The KDHE portion of the permit (Part I) will be issued under the authority of K.S.A. 65-3430 et seq. and K.A.R. 28-31-4 through 28-31-279a, and the EPA portion of the permit (Part II) will be issued under the authority of sections 3001(g), 3001(h), 3002 (b), 3004(d), 3004 (u) and (v), 3005, and 6001 of RCRA.

Part I of the permit will authorize Fort Riley to continue closing the HWSF in accordance with the approved closure plan, and also will establish closure requirements for the OB/OD unit that must be met when the area is no longer necessary to the Fort Riley mission. A maximum of 9,240 gallons of containerized decontamination fluids and other solid hazardous waste that are generated from and during closure may be stored in the permitted stor-

age area until closure of the HWSF is complete. The materials stored at the facility have included ignitable, corrosive, reactive, toxic, and listed liquid or solid hazardous wastes. The container storage area complies with 40 CFR Part 264 Subparts I and CC, and Part 270 requirements for container storage areas. Emergency equipment is available at the facility and appropriate warning signs are posted. The EPA portion (Part II) of the joint permit will address the requirements of HSWA.

Anyone wishing to comment on the draft permit should submit written comments postmarked not later than September 25 to Mostafa Kamal (KDHE) or Chris Jump (EPA) at the above addresses.

A public hearing has not been scheduled; however, if written requests are received that indicate a significant degree of public interest in the draft permit a public hearing will be scheduled. After consideration of all comments received, the Secretary of Health and Environment and the EPA director of the Air and Waste Management Division will make a final permit decision. Notice will be given to the applicant, to all persons who submitted written comments, to those who commented at the public hearing, and to those who requested notice of the final permit decision. If none of the comments received during the public comment period result in revisions to the draft permit, the permit will become effective immediately upon its issuance. If comments received during the public comment period result in revisions, the permit will become effective 30 days after service of notice of the final decision or at a later date, if a review is requested under 40 CFR 124.19.

Notice Concerning Kansas/Federal Water Pollution Control Permits and Applications

In accordance with Kansas Administrative Regulations 28-16-57 through 63, 28-18-1 through 15, 28-18a-1 through 32, 28-16-150 through 154, 28-46-7, and the authority vested with the state by the administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, various draft water pollution control documents (permits, notices to revoke and reissue, notices to terminate) have been prepared and/or permit applications have been received for discharges to waters of the United States and the state of Kansas for the class of discharges described below.

The proposed actions concerning the draft documents are based on staff review, applying the appropriate standards, regulations and effluent limitations of the state of Kansas and the Environmental Protection Agency. The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Environment, Bureau of Waste Management, will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Monday, October 17, in Room 530 of the Curtis State Office Building, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed amendments to hazardous waste regulation K.A.R. 28-31-10 concerning hazardous waste monitoring fees. A summary of the proposed regulation, the estimated economic impact and the environmental benefit follows:

K.A.R. 28-31-10. The Kansas hazardous waste program monitors hazardous waste activities in the state and is funded by a federal grant and various fees paid by the generators, transporters and handlers of hazardous waste. The maximum fee for each facility is limited by statute to \$50,000 annually. Current fees range from \$100 to \$15,000 per year.

The fee revenue currently collected is inadequate to meet the projected budgetary needs of the hazardous waste regulatory program, even with reduced program staffing. This proposed amended regulation increases the annual monitoring fees for treatment, storage and disposal (TSD) facilities and hazardous waste generators, while reducing the fees for hazardous waste transporters to reflect the actual level of staff monitoring required for these activities. The proposed fee changes are shown in the following schedule. The number of facilities of each type is indicated in parentheses.

The “incinerator facility” category has been removed since incineration is a type of thermal treatment. In addition, a typographical error in paragraph (b)(3) will be corrected.

Economic Impact: The estimated annual increase in cost to the TSD universe is \$185,500. Hazardous waste generator fees will increase by \$108,300. Hazardous waste transporters will save a combined total of \$8,500 each year. This results in a total of increased costs to the regulated hazardous waste community of \$285,500.

There is no increase in costs to the agency. There is no cost to other governmental agencies or units or the general public unless they are part of the hazardous waste management system.

Environmental Benefit: The proposed changes to hazardous waste fees do not provide direct environmental benefits. However, failure to sustain an adequate state regulatory program due to a budget shortfall could result in serious environmental impacts.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing serves as the required public comment period of at least 60 days for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulatory action. A public hearing will be conducted at 1 p.m. Wednesday, October 19, in Room 106 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the EMS Services Manager, Room 1031, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Ann Stevenson at (785) 296-7296. Handicapped parking is located in front of and to the north of the Landon State Office Building.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows. (Note: the statement "the regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact" is intended to indicate that no economic impact on the Board of Emergency Medical Services, other state agencies, state employees, owner/operators of the services or the general public has been identified.)

K.A.R. 109-1-1. Definitions. This regulation was amended to support new language in all other EMS regulations and statutes and is consistent with the changes as a result of the scope of practice. Since this regulation clarifies current language, the regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 109-1-2. Medical adviser. This regulation is being amended to maintain consistency in the spelling in regulations and mirrors the language in the statutes. The regulation simply changes the spelling of "medical advisor" to "medical adviser." This is not a change to current policy. The regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 109-2-1. Ambulance service operator. This regulation is being revised to assign the operator as the primary responsible party as opposed to the service director and authorizes them to delegate a person to serve as the service director and delineates their responsibilities. The operator is also responsible to notify the board, within seven days, if the service director leaves the service or a new service director is appointed. The regulation also requires the service director to notify the Board of Emergency Medical Services of each attendant from their at-

tendant roster within 90 days of the addition or removal of any attendants and any change of the medical director within 30 days. The regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 109-2-2. Application for ambulance service permit and ambulance license; permit renewal and license renewal. This regulatory change adds a new type of permit: Type IIA. This addition demarcates Type II services that can provide advance life support as opposed to the Type II that provides basic life support. The regulation also requires service operators to utilize a certified mechanic to do annual inspections and ensures a qualified mechanic services the ambulances. The regulation ensures that applications are submitted for renewal in a timely fashion and provides direction for the board in the event the service fails to comply. The regulation defines specific data required on the renewal forms and submission of the service's protocol and supply list of items carried on the ambulance. Some services may incur expense to retain or contract with a certified mechanic.

K.A.R. 109-2-4. Display of permits, licenses, and certificates. This regulation is being revoked and the language has been moved to other regulations specific to their requirements.

K.A.R. 109-2-5. Ambulance service operational standards. This regulation clarifies the operational standards for an ambulance service. The regulation eliminates the service's responsibility to participate in the operation and maintenance of the communication system and ensures it has a two-way interoperable communication system. The regulation eliminates language referring specific individuals, law enforcement and correction officers to board the ambulance with a firearm and requires individual services to include an operational policy for dealing with firearms in a safe manner. Three additional operational policies have been added: mutual aid, patient confidentiality, and extrication of persons from entrapment. The regulation ensures the vehicle is kept clean and in good working order and that linen is changed after every patient whether disposable or not. The regulation stipulates a service has to provide an alternate plan to cover its respective service area that is approved by the executive director, if for some reason its unit is out of service for more than 24 hours. An extension may be approved if the service makes a good faith effort in restoring service. The regulation requires services to retain service records for three years. The regulation clarifies language requiring quality assurance and documented participation by the service's medical director. The regulation provides a 60-day time frame for a self-reportable incident after completion of internal reviews. The regulation removes the standards for Type V air ambulances and places them in their specific regulation, i.e., 109-2-10a, 109-2-11, 109-2-12 and 109-2-13. There could be cost in developing and implementing new required policies.

K.A.R. 109-2-6. Classes of ambulance services. This regulation adds a new service type, i.e., Type IIA. This new type of service allows a service to provide ALS or BLS depending on the staffing described in 109-2-7. The regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

(continued)

K.A.R. 109-2-7. Ground ambulance staffing. This regulation includes staffing consistent with the scope of practice. The regulation also moves Type V air ambulance staffing to 109-2-13. The regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 109-2-8. Standards for type I, type II, type IIA, and type V ground ambulances and equipment. Language was revised to clarify current requirements of ground ambulances. Display of licenses was also moved to this regulation from 109-2-4, which was revoked. The regulation also allows the service to secure fire extinguishers for easy accessibility for the driver and attendant. The regulation also decreases the storage capacity for oxygen. The regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 109-2-10a. Air safety program and informational publication. This is a new regulation and the language was moved to this regulation from 109-2-5 to keep all regulations pertaining to air ambulances in Type V air ambulance regulations. The regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 109-2-11. Standards for type V air ambulances and equipment. A considerable amount of the regulation was removed because of redundancy with the Federal Aviation Administration requirements. Air medical services operate predominately under two specific parts of the Code of Federal regulation (CFR): part 91 specific to air space and part 135. Part 135 provides specific regulations for air carriers, including air ambulances. The CFRs have more stringent constraints. The regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 109-2-12. Standards for rotor-wing ambulance aircraft and equipment. A considerable amount of the regulation was removed because the Federal Aviation Administration requires more stringent constraints. The regulation does dictate the staffing for rotor wing aircrafts and is relatively consistent with old language from 109-2-7. Three optional training courses have been added: International Trauma Life Support-Advanced, Critical Care Emergency Medical Technician Paramedic, and Flight Paramedic Certification. The regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 109-2-13. Standards for fixed-wing ambulance aircraft and equipment. A considerable amount of the regulation was removed because the Federal Aviation Administration requires more stringent constraints. The regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

The regulations that will be heard during the regulatory hearing portion of the meeting are as follows:

K.A.R. 115-2-3. This permanent regulation establishes the camping, utility and other fees for state parks. The proposed amendments would increase utility fees by \$1.00 to offset rising utility costs.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable negative economic impact on the department, other agencies, small businesses or the public.

K.A.R. 115-8-1. This permanent regulation establishes hunting, furharvesting and discharge of firearms restrictions on public lands. The proposed amendments update

the reference document restrictions for various properties.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable negative economic impact on the department, other agencies, small businesses or the public.

K.A.R. 115-8-9. This permanent regulation establishes camping restrictions on department lands and waters. The proposed amendments would waive occupancy requirements for prepaid state park campsites reserved through the department's electronic reservation system.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable negative economic impact on the department, other agencies, small businesses or the public.

K.A.R. 115-8-10. This permanent regulation establishes provisions and restrictions for pets on department lands and waters. The proposed amendments would allow pets in designated public-use department cabins.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable negative economic impact on the department, other agencies, small businesses or the public.

K.A.R. 115-17-1. This permanent regulation establishes legal species, harvest seasons, size restrictions, daily limits and possession limits for commercial harvest of fish bait. The proposed amendments would remove amphibians from the list of species available for commercial harvest and are proposed in conjunction with a regulation package designed to prevent the introduction and spread of invasive species.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable negative economic impact on the department, other agencies, small businesses or the public.

K.A.R. 115-17-2. This permanent regulation establishes commercial sale of fish bait requirements. The proposed amendments would alter the list of fish and crayfish species available for commercial sale, require certification of pathogen free status, require holding and retail tanks to use a potable water source and require receipts to accompany bait fish sales. The amendments are proposed in conjunction with a regulation package designed to prevent the introduction and spread of invasive species.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendments may have an economic impact on commercial bait dealers. Otherwise, the proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable negative economic impact on the department, other agencies, small businesses or the public.

K.A.R. 115-17-2a. This new permanent regulation establishes testing procedures for certification of pathogen free status of bait fish for sale. The proposed regulation would enact testing procedures similar to those used in other states and are proposed in conjunction with a regulation package designed to prevent the introduction and spread of invasive species.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable negative economic impact on the department, other agencies, small businesses or the public.

POWER PLAY TO KANSAS SPEEDWAY DRAWINGS

111-5-200. Name of drawings. The Kansas lottery shall conduct three drawings entitled "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings." The first drawing will be held on or about April 29, 2011; the second drawing will be held on or about September 2, 2011; and the third drawing will be held on or about October 9, 2011. Entries for the first drawing will be accepted on or after February 20, 2011, through April 26, 2011; entries for the second drawing will be accepted on or after February 20, 2011, through August 30, 2011; and entries for the third and final drawing will be accepted on or after February 20, 2011, through October 9, 2011. Rules applicable to the "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Racing Drawings" are contained in K.A.R. 111-5-200 through 111-5-205 and K.A.R. 111-6-1, *et seq.* (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-17-11, Feb. 16, 2011.)

111-5-201. Definitions. (a) All definitions contained in the Kansas lottery act (K.S.A. 74-8701 *et seq.*) and lottery regulations are hereby incorporated by reference and govern unless otherwise indicated.

(b) "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings" means the act(s) of drawing prizes conducted by the Kansas lottery at a location designated by the executive director, in which participants are selected to win various prizes as described in these rules.

(c) "Entry form" means the qualified entry form generated by a computer terminal at a Kansas lottery selling location which entitles the player to enter the "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings."

(d) "Receptacle" or "drum" means a container in which the entry forms are placed and from which the entries to the "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings" are drawn. Receptacles or drums may be sealable

and shall be capable of being mixed or rotated for the purpose of ensuring random distribution.

(e) "Bare arm technique" means a type of drawing where the person drawing the winning entry form from the receptacle or drum wears a long-sleeved shirt with sleeve rolled up above the elbow, a short-sleeved shirt (sleeve not extending past the elbow) or a no-sleeve shirt which exposes the drawer's bare arm and looks away from the drawing drum or receptacle while drawing. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-17-11, Feb. 16, 2011.)

111-5-202. Prizes. (a) The winner of the grand prize at the "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings," which will be conducted on or about October 9, 2011, shall receive a 2011 Ford Mustang GT Kansas Speedway pace car, along with licensing, title, and registration fees, and state and mandatory withholding taxes.

(b) The 40 winners drawn in the drawing conducted on or about April 29, 2011, shall each receive a secondary prize consisting of a racing weekend package for two persons. The winners of the racing prize packages drawn on or about April 29, 2011, will receive two tickets to the NASCAR Camping World Truck Series O'Reilly Auto Parts 250 and the NASCAR Sprint Cup Series Kansas 400 races to be held on June 4 and 5, 2011; one double occupancy hotel room and room taxes for the evenings of June 3, 2011, and June 4, 2011; standard hotel parking; round-trip transportation between Kansas Speedway and the hotel; food and other amenities at the Kansas lottery hospitality chalet located at Kansas Speedway; \$400 cash; and mandatory state and federal withholding taxes.

(c) The 40 winners drawn in the drawing conducted on or about September 2, 2011, shall each receive a secondary prize consisting of a racing weekend package for two persons. The winners of the racing prize packages drawn on or about September 2, 2011, will receive two tickets to the NASCAR Nationwide Series Kansas Lottery 300 and the NASCAR Sprint Cup Series Hollywood Casino 400 races to be held on October 8, and 9, 2011; one double occupancy hotel room and room taxes for the evenings of October 7, 2011, and October 8, 2011; standard hotel parking; round-trip transportation between Kansas Speedway and the hotel; food and other amenities at the Kansas lottery hospitality chalet located at Kansas Speedway; \$400 cash; and mandatory state and federal withholding taxes.

(d) The following restrictions shall apply to the secondary race weekend prize packages:

(1) The Kansas lottery is not responsible for any losses caused by delay or cancellation of said automobile race.

(2) Prize packages are transferable one time and cannot be redeemed for cash.

(3) The lottery shall choose and reserve all hotel rooms.

(4) The lottery shall provide transportation to and from Kansas Speedway on a scheduled basis. All other transportation is the responsibility of the prize winners.

(5) Prize winners will receive notification of their prize, but the actual prize will be delivered at a time and place to be announced by the lottery.

(6) Any meals, drinks, gratuities, taxes, and other expenses that are not specifically mentioned are not included.

(7) The hotel may require winners to produce a major credit card at the time of check-in. Winners are responsible for all hotel charges incurred in excess of the basic room charge, and standard parking fees for one vehicle for each prize package. The lottery shall not be responsible for any additional expenses charged to the room.

(e) There will be 40 (forty) winners of secondary racing weekend prizes selected at each drawing conducted on or about April 29, 2011, and September 2, 2011.

(f) All prizes are subject to lottery validation, set-offs and deductions authorized by law.

(g) The winner of a prize shall return to the lottery a completed claim form as provided by the lottery within 14 calendar days in which his or her ticket was drawn or the person named on the ticket drawn will no longer be eligible for the prize. In such an event, the first eligible alternate entry drawn for that prize pursuant to these rules shall be declared the winner.

(h) If any prize in this drawing becomes unavailable, the lottery reserves the right to replace it with a prize of the lottery's choice of approximately equal value. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-17-11, Feb. 16, 2011.)

111-5-203. Method of entry. (a) Entry into the "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings" to be conducted on or about April 29, 2011, September 2, 2011, and October 9, 2011, shall be accomplished as follows:

(1) Obtain a valid entry form by purchasing Powerball with Power Play on a single \$10 ticket. A valid entry form will automatically dispense from the Kansas lottery selling terminal following any single \$10 ticket purchase of Powerball with Power Play.

(2) Complete the entry form including name, address, and telephone number in a legible manner. Only one name shall appear on an entry form.

(3) Entries may be mailed with proper postage to "Power Play to Kansas Speedway, c/o Kansas lottery, P. O. Box 3561, Topeka, Kansas 66601-3561." Mailed entries for the drawing conducted on or about April 29, 2011, must be received by the morning mail pickup on Tuesday, April 26, 2011. Mailed entries for the drawing conducted on or about September 2, 2011, must be received by the morning mail pickup on Tuesday, August 30, 2011. Mailed entries for the drawing to be conducted on or about October 9, 2011, must be received by the morning mail pickup on Tuesday, October 4, 2011. More than one entry may be mailed in one envelope.

(4) Players may also deposit entries for these drawings at any receptacle which the lottery has specifically designated for deposit of said entries. All entries deposited at lottery designated receptacles must be received by 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, April 26, 2011, for the drawing to be conducted on or about April 29, 2011; and by 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 30, 2011, for the drawing to be conducted on or about September 2, 2011.

(5) All lottery designated drawing receptacles shall be closed by 5 p.m. on Tuesday, October 4, 2011, at 5 p.m. for entries into the third and final drawing to be conducted on or about October 9, 2011, except for the drawing receptacles located at the Kansas lottery location at the Kansas Speedway where entries will be accepted dur-

ing the hours of operation beginning October 7, 2011, through approximately 10:00 a.m. on October 9, 2011.

(b) The holder of an entry form is not required to personally attend the drawing or be present at the time of the drawing to be determined a winner.

(c) The first drawing will be conducted on or about April 29, 2011; the second drawing will be conducted on or about September 2, 2011; and the third and final drawing will be conducted on or about October 9, 2011.

(d) There is no limit on the number of entries a person may make, but a person may only win one time in each drawing.

(e) Only valid "Power Play to Kansas Speedway" entries which are mailed to "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings, c/o Kansas lottery, P. O. Box 3561, Topeka, Kansas 66601-3561" with proper postage and received by the morning mail pickups in Topeka, Kansas, by the dates set forth in these rules and entries entered at the Kansas lottery location at Kansas Speedway and other locations as may be specifically designated by the lottery shall be eligible for the drawing.

(f) Eligible entrants in the "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings" must be 18 years of age or older.

(g) Completing the information entry form and entering the form into the drawing constitutes authorization to publicly identify the person whose entry is drawn. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-17-11, Feb. 16, 2011.)

111-5-204. Selection of winners. The following process shall be used for the selection of winners in the "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings:"

(a) Kansas lottery personnel shall pick up all mail containing "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawing" entries at the United States Post Office in Topeka, Kansas, with the final pick ups at the Topeka post office in the morning mail pickups on Tuesday, April 26, 2011, for the first drawing to be conducted on or about April 29, 2011; Tuesday, August 30, 2011, for the second drawing to be conducted on or about September 2, 2011; and Tuesday, October 4, 2011, for the third and final drawing to be conducted on or about October 9, 2011. Following the morning mail pickups on said dates, the envelopes containing mailed entries will be transported to lottery headquarters and opened by lottery personnel. All mailed entries and entries retained from receptacles at locations specifically designated by the lottery, excluding those entries which may be deposited at the Kansas lottery selling location at the Kansas Speedway on October 7, 8, and 9, 2011, shall then be placed in the drawing receptacle or drum. The entries made at the Kansas Speedway on October 7, 8, and 9, 2011, shall be placed directly into the drawing receptacle or drum.

(b) The drawings on or about April 29, 2011, and September 2, 2011, shall be held at Kansas lottery headquarters and shall be open to the public with lottery security personnel present. The drawings shall be audio and video taped.

(c) The third and final drawing to be conducted on or about October 9, 2011, shall be held at the Kansas Speedway and shall be open to the public with lottery security personnel present. The drawing shall be audio and video taped.

(d) At all three drawings described herein above, lottery security personnel will be present with the person designated by the executive director to perform the drawing. Prior to each drawing, if a drum is used, the drum shall be sealed and the contents mixed by rotating the drum at least 10 times. If a receptacle other than a drum is used, the contents shall be thoroughly mixed prior to the drawing.

(e) At the drawings conducted on or about April 29, 2011, and September 2, 2011, the designated individual shall unseal the drum, if a drum is used, and using the bare-arm technique, while looking away, remove 40 entries from the receptacle or drum, one at a time. The person whose name appears on each entry shall be the winner of one of the secondary prize packages identified in these rules subject to validation by the lottery as set forth in these rules. Each valid entry shall be numbered from one through 40.

(f) After 40 entries have been drawn at each drawing conducted on or about April 29, 2011, and September 2, 2011, and the entries have been verified as valid, 10 more entries will be drawn, one at a time. The last 10 entries drawn will serve as alternate entries for the prize packages. The alternate entries will be marked in order drawn, 1A, 2A, 3A, 4A, 5A, 6A, 7A, 8A, 9A, and 10A. The alternate entries will be used only if one or more of the original winners cannot be located or is declared ineligible, or fails to present a fully-executed claim form to lottery headquarters by 5:00 p.m. of the fourteenth calendar day following each of the drawings. The alternates will be used, if necessary, in the order drawn. If an alternate winner cannot be located, is declared ineligible, or fails to present a fully-executed claim form to lottery headquarters by 5:00 p.m. of the fourteenth calendar day following the claim form being given or sent to the alternate winner, the alternate winner process shall be repeated until the prize is properly claimed or until such time as no alternate winners remain, whichever occurs first.

(g) At the drawing conducted on or about October 9, 2011, the designated individual shall unseal the drum, if a drum is used, and using the bare-arm technique, while looking away, remove one entry from the receptacle or drum. The person whose name appears on the entry shall be the winner of the grand prize identified in these rules subject to validation by the lottery as set forth in these rules. The valid entry shall be identified as grand prize winner.

(h) After one entry has been drawn at the drawing on or about October 9, 2011, and the entry has been verified as valid, three more entries shall be drawn, one at a time. The last three entries drawn will serve as alternate entries for the grand prize. The alternate entries will be marked in order drawn, 1A-GP, 2A-GP, and 3A-GP. The alternate entries will be used only if the original winner cannot be located or is declared ineligible, or fails to present a fully-executed claim form to lottery headquarters by 5:00 p.m. of the fourteenth calendar day following each of the drawings. The alternates will be used, if necessary, in the order drawn. If an alternate winner cannot be located, is declared ineligible, or fails to present a fully-executed claim form to lottery headquarters by 5:00 p.m. of the

(continued)

fourteenth calendar day following the claim form being given or sent to the alternate winner, the alternate winner process shall be repeated until the prize is properly claimed or until such time as no alternate winners remain, whichever occurs first.

(i) The Kansas lottery security official present shall review each ticket drawn to determine the validity of the entry into the "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings" in accordance with these regulations. If it is a valid entry and the name is legible, the event manager and the security person present shall record the name of the winner and the prize won. Each winner shall be given or sent a prize claim form to be completed and returned to the lottery within 14 calendar days of the drawing.

(j) If the entry is determined to be ineligible, it shall be discarded by the security person present and another entry drawn. This procedure will be repeated until valid selections are obtained.

(k) Only valid entry forms generated pursuant to these rules are eligible for the drawing.

(l) All entries remaining in the drum or receptacle after the drawings are conducted on or about April 29, 2011, and September 2, 2011, shall remain in the drum or receptacle and shall be eligible to be drawn for a prize in any subsequent drawing identified in these rules.

(m) Any alternate entries drawn in any of the drawings conducted pursuant to these rules that are not awarded a prize shall be returned to the drum or receptacle and shall be eligible to be drawn for a prize in any subsequent drawing identified in these rules.

(n) Any duplicate entries drawn in any of the drawings conducted pursuant to these rules that are not awarded a prize shall be returned to the drum and receptacle and shall be eligible to be drawn for a prize in any subsequent drawing identified in these rules.

(o) After the winner of the grand prize and alternates have been selected at the third and final drawing conducted on or about October 9, 2011, all entries remaining in the drawing drum or receptacle, along with all entries received which are not in compliance with these rules, shall be destroyed pursuant to K.A.R. 111-3-34. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-17-11, Feb. 16, 2011.)

111-5-205. Certification of drawings. (a) The "Power Play to Kansas Speedway Drawings" shall be personally observed by a member of the Kansas lottery security department and a member of the Kansas lottery marketing department and other person or persons designated by the executive director of the lottery (hereinafter "event manager").

(b) Upon completion of each drawing described in these rules, the security official and the event manager shall issue a report to the executive director, certifying that the name of each prize winner is correct, and that to the best of their knowledge the procedures required by these rules were followed in selecting the prize winners. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-17-11, Feb. 16, 2011.)
